1.4. Treasurer’s Report

Ron Schott, Treasurer reported that current funds on hand as of November 12, 2018 total approximately \$25,877 with recent expenses. Ron circulated Desert Financial Credit Union reports with account and transaction details for Board reference which are included at the back of these Minutes.

Without any current monetary sponsors, sustainability remains a concern. There are a few new fees for launching the redesigned web site through Weebly, however some legacy subscriptions and costs can be subsequently phased out. Craig Stevenson has incurred several hundred dollars in accumulated expenses for possible reimbursement to be documented and payment coordinated with Ron.

1.5. ATIC Board Membership

1.5.1. Nominations and Election of Board Members

We continue to need to expand participation with direct State of Arizona representation, as well as focus on rural and native stakeholder representation especially from the economic development community, and representatives from municipal, county, and higher education CIOs, as well as stronger broadband industry participation going forward.

Jay Schlum, ATIC Chairman has been meeting individually with select current Board members to garner their opinions about ATIC in the current environment and gauge their interest in actively participating. Now that the redesigned website has launched it is timely for the Chair to lead in engaging new Board prospects. Jay has drafted a cover letter template to personalize when reaching out to a number of specific new parties seeking their active involvement in ATIC and consideration of a Board role. 3. Activity Reports

3.1 Arizona Broadband Strategic Plan & FirstNet (Karen Ziegler, Mark Goldstein)

Karen Ziegler, Arizona FirstNet Project Manager (<https://azfirstnet.az.gov/>) was not in attendance. Mark Goldstein will reach out to Karen and catch up on the Arizona Broadband Strategic Plan work recently completed by an ACA led team and the status of their report with recommendations provided to the Governor's Office for further action. When the report is finalized, it is expected to become public. ATIC remains keenly interested in helping the state undertake initiatives and provide leadership to facilitate broadband development.

The Arizona Broadband Strategic Plan issued in February, 2018 can be downloaded at https://azfirstnet.az.gov/sites/default/files/media/AZ%20Broadband%20Strategic%20Plan_FIN_AL.pdf. Mark Goldstein created and previously distributed an excerpted version of the final Arizona Broadband Assessment Project (AZ BAP) Methodology Report from late 2014 focusing on the AZ BAP project overview and policy work.

AT&T is working aggressively on Arizona FirstNet planning and implementation, with some 80 new towers and substantial new wireless infrastructure to be built out over the next 3-4 years. ADOA has been coordinating the general location of the planned new towers and otherwise supporting the engagement of the Arizona Public Safety community and AT&T's efforts.

3.2 Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network (Steve Peters)

ATIC's Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network was formed earlier in the year to facilitate discussion between key state government officials and other stakeholders, follow up on the State broadband rural focus groups and strategic plan issuance for leveraging State/ACC funding, assist with leveraging E-rate funding, and developing public private partnerships.

Steve has put up a preliminary Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network website at <https://www.arizonatele.org/about-stakeholder-network.html> for group resource sharing and planning purposes. After a period of limited activity, he will now begin to ramp up leadership engagement and planning.

The next action is to develop and hold a broadband stakeholder roundtable, something ATIC had done periodically in the past. There remain issues as to how we would acquire names and contact vectors of potential roundtable attendees and future roundtable participants. Another leadership team meeting will be held to begin to address details and planning. Henry Goldberg volunteered to help Steve with outreach and garnering responses. Steve received a grant from the Mobilize AZ Grants Program (<https://www.mobilizeaz.com/grant-program/>) to provide a platform that does most of what we need for CRM activities.

A separate means of vendor engagement by ATIC should be developed in parallel and will be on the agenda for future ATIC consideration and action.

3.3 Rural Community Outreach (All)

Mark Goldstein reported on Bill Bolin's recent white paper and report to ATIC regarding rural communities in Arizona and his observations and recommendations for rural broadband success. Bill also recommended significant ATIC transformations in organizational structure and practices as documented in the October 10, 2018 minutes, accompanied there by Bill's associated slide deck. Bill recommended that ATIC become a membership organization charging dues, event fees, and otherwise raising funds, allowing the hiring of an Executive Director and support staff functions while simultaneously becoming more active in developing and implementing projects, seeking and managing grants, producing RFPs, etc.

Jay Schlum suggested that Board Members and Associates should offer suggestions on improving our engagement and impact. However, the general feeling as expressed by attending Board members was that we are not in a strong enough current position to enact some of these suggestions. Certainly we could and should entertain and undertake some of the projects that require less heavy lifting, such as grant identification and brokering by utilizing Karen Ziegler's ADOA capabilities, while going forward as a volunteer organization.

Nan Williams inquired as to what we done regarding strategic planning. Mark summarized the conclusions reached as part of last year's SWOT analysis: (1) merge with some other group, (2) improve our website and continue more or less as in the past, and (3) a full reorganization and vigorous transformation and initiatives engagement. The Board vote was about 50% to continue as in the past, 25% a full transformation similar to what Bill suggested (3) and 25% merge with someone else. Steve said that strategy plan focused on organizational structure, but did not address strategic directions and objectives. He feels we really should have a session led by the Scottsdale-Based strategic planning group. Mark said if we go to that planning group it should be after we have added new board members. Oris, Nan, and Schott agreed.

The Executive Committee committed to undertake further discussions of Bill's suggested pathways and report back to the Board, engaging in productive dialogue and consideration.

3.4 K12/GAZeL Education Report (Steve Peters, Nan Williams)

Greater Arizona eLearning (GAZeL, <http://www.gazel.org/>) continues its transition into a 501(c)(3) non-profit by reforming under the Arizona Telecom & Information Institute (ATI Institute) corporate shell. The repurposed organization would remain an option for managing future broadband grant opportunities in conjunction with ATIC.

GAZeL is planning for a conference on disruptive learning next year at a Tucson venue TBD including a planning exercise for schools and district implementation and a closing reception. Science Foundation Arizona and/or Helios Project may support. Possible Tucson venue is at the Air and Space Museum. AzTEA has adopted standards and is holding a professional development meetup in Gilbert on 12/1/18.

Pima Community College has received a \$200,000 grant for Open Educational Resources (OER). Steve spoke with Dennis Harper of GenYes (<https://www.genyes.org/>) who is interested in talking to ATIC regarding working with banks on Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) which has evolved to allow funding for schools with the goal of their supporting

broadband buildouts for nonprofits and schools. Mark Goldstein is doing an impact study for Cisco Foundation of the 9 educational technology grants they gave out in the Yuma area.

3.4.1 GAZeL, ATIC, and AzTEA have established a project to explore interest, feasibility and a strategy to develop a statewide partnership and funding mechanism with Labster, the Virtual Laboratory Simulation Education Group based in Denmark, and K-12 schools, universities and community colleges to provide appropriate Labster virtual online lab modules for all educational institutions in Arizona for free or at a low cost. Sam Butcher of Labster visited Arizona in June among other Labster higher ed visits here. A demonstration project in some rural Arizona schools remains a priority. The feasibility of forming a consortium to provide Labster curricula throughout all of Arizona is being explored. Steve has constructed a working website for this project at <https://gazel-labster.weebly.com/> and will shortly restart efforts to advance.

3.5 Arizona State Library (Holly Henley, Mala Muralidharan)

State Library has helped facilitate the Navajo-Gila Counties Consortium of schools and libraries, while cultivating Apache, Santa Cruz, and Yavapai Counties as additional consortium participants. E-rate filing by deadline for this cycle optimized utilization of the Arizona funds and the FCC special program expiring this year. State Libraries and the Department of Education await final e-rate funding approvals of the \$194M in applications which should be known by December. However, the Navajo-Gila Counties Consortium has encountered significant difficulties with their application which is still pending, but likely not to be approved. They didn't abide by their own selection criteria by giving the grant to RedRock which is much costlier than other bidders and has other issues in their application. Mala indicated that smaller consortiums in Northeast Arizona may be formed. Library's focus this year was Category 2 funding.

State Library has a network assessment tool that will be sent to the libraries. Jim Simms expressed interest in possibly providing some expertise for these Category 2 applications by travelling to some of these rural libraries. Mala attended the Schools, Health, Libraries Broadband (SHLB, <http://www.shlb.org/>) Conference in D.C. and is on a broadband for legislative solutions working group. She is working on a paper about Category 2 continuation beyond 2020 and another about vendor switching during an award application period. There is a huge gap in Internet access for schools nationwide. Mala spoke about possibility of selling spectrum back to the FCC for about 19 Billion dollars.

State Library personnel continue to visit libraries around the State to hold workshops and help with technology assessments. State Library is also working with EducationSuperHighway (<https://www.educationsuperhighway.org/>) on webinars for broadband in rural areas and access to their tools, templates, etc. that explain importance of broadband in rural areas.

The Arizona Library Association (AZLA) annual conference (<https://2018.azla.org/>) was held October 25-26, 2018 at the Mesa Convention Center with a theme of Libraries Transform Because Access Equals Opportunity including a broadband panel.

3.6 Telehealth (Janet Major)

The Arizona Telemedicine Program (<http://telemedicine.arizona.edu/>) held their annual Telemedicine & Telehealth Register Service Provider Showcase (SPS, <http://tspworld.com/>) in Glendale on October 8-9, 2018 with about 400 attendees.

Mark conveyed Janet Major's message complimenting Mike Keeling for his contribution at a recent Flagstaff telemedicine conference. Janet also provided links about AI and telehealth.

3.7 Government Affairs (Mike Keeling, Mark Goldstein)

Mark Goldstein led ATIC Board workshopping of the State Broadband sections of the Arizona Technology Council's Public Policy Guide for 2019 which led to the inclusion of a number of refinements and valuable additions especially from Henry Goldberg and Karen Ziegler. The evolving Broadband sections were distributed to ATIC Board members throughout the process and additional input garnered. The only significant issue that was removed concerned support for the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC) expanding their Arizona Universal Service Fund (AUSF) fee collection and application to underserved broadband area. Additionally, final editing for brevity compressed some of the verbiage, but retained the concepts and recommendations. The final version can be downloaded from <https://www.aztechcouncil.org/arizona-technology-council-public-policy-guide/>.

However, the sense of ATIC is that we would like to see the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC) expand the use of AUSF funds beyond the e-rate matching program that is sunsetting to other rural broadband purposes and for the Arizona Department of Education's broadband fund to be refreshed with additional \$ from year to year.

3.8 ATI Institute (Oris Friesen)

GAZeL is proceeding with the renaming and repurposing of ATI Institute to e-learning purposes under its 501(c)(3) framework. ATI Institute has disbursed to ATIC repayment of its \$2K loan and approx. \$1.2K in residual funds as noted in the Treasurer's report above. A \$2K sponsorship from Ted Kraver will remain with the transitioned entity.

The repurposed organization would remain an option for managing future broadband grant opportunities in conjunction with ATIC as would the Arizona Technology Council Foundation and other potential partners.

4 Information and Action Plans

4.1 ATIC New Website Status & Outlook (All)

Steve Peters prototyped a replacement ATIC website on the Weebly platform. The completed website refresh was completed and cutover to which a number of members contributed ideas and content. You can find the relaunched site at the normal URL <http://www.arizonatele.org/>.

Some background information seems to have gotten lost in the conversion from Weebly's subdomain to the normal ATIC URL which Steve has committed to restore. Mark also has committed to building out the repository of ATIC reference and historical documents.

4.2 ATIC Domains, Mailing List & CRM (All)

Mark has current credentials for the GoDaddy account holding ATIC-related domain names and can now modify the records including contact information and redirection of DNS as needed.

Mark reiterated that we need to rebuild our mailing list likely in cooperation with GAZeL and has begun discussions with Steve Peters on how best to accomplish this. Mark is currently utilizing SendinBlue (<https://www.sendinblue.com/>) for publishing his monthly Arizona Technology and Economic Development Events calendar.

4.3 New Business or Motion Considerations (All)

Several other items were briefly discussed:

Jay opened up discussion with the new guests Karen Miller of Zayo and Ron Drake of La Paz County on their impressions of ATIC and how we could best work with them going forward. For Ron Drake, Mala can brief him on what library resources are available in La Paz County, especially at the Parker Library and connect him with Milan Eaton at the Arizona Department of Education for assistance on understanding school connectivity. Mark suggested that Karen Ziegler should be able to provide some FirstNet deployment and infrastructure assessment information on LaPaz County as well. Jim Simms complimented Mala on her progress and as he is now doing independent consulting, indicated he would like to work with her on rural libraries' broadband assessments and deployment issues.
