3. Activity Reports

3.1 Arizona Broadband Strategic Plan & FirstNet (Karen Ziegler, Mark Goldstein)

Karen Ziegler, Arizona FirstNet Project Manager (<https://azfirstnet.az.gov/>) was not in attendance but Mark Goldstein has had recent conversations and provided brief updates. A working team led by ACA has been following up on the Arizona Broadband Strategic Plan (https://azfirstnet.az.gov/sites/default/files/media/AZ%20Broadband%20Strategic%20Plan_FIN_AL.pdf) from February 2018 and has provided a report with recommendations to the Governor's Office for further action.

The Governor's budget provides for a full-time Arizona Broadband Director based at the Arizona Commerce Authority responsible for coordinating all State government broadband planning and serving as a resource for local leaders seeking to improve rural broadband connectivity. Additionally, ACA's Arizona Competes Fund will set aside \$3 million to provide matching funds to offset construction costs of expanding broadband services in underserved rural areas across the state. Grants will be awarded to local partnerships or ventures with clear and achievable plans to improve broadband services in one or more underserved rural areas. ATIC remains keenly interested in helping the State undertake initiatives and provide leadership to facilitate broadband development.

As of the State Inauguration on January 7th, Arizona has a new Secretary of State, Katie Hobbs, who has State Libraries with Holly Henley and Mala Muralidharan under her purview. And Kathy Hoffman became Superintendent of Public Instruction with Satish Pattisapu and Milan Eaton under her. There were discussions of how ATIC builds our relationships with these new leaders and involves them in our initiatives.

3.2 Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network (Steve Peters)

The Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network was formed last year as a partnership between ATIC and GAZeL to facilitate discussion between key state government officials and other stakeholders, follow up on the State broadband rural focus groups and strategic plan issuance for leveraging State/ACC funding, assist with leveraging E-rate funding, and developing public private partnerships.

Steve Peters has put up a preliminary Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network website at <https://www.arizonatele.org/about-stakeholder-network.html> for group resource sharing and planning purposes and is beginning to ramp up leadership engagement and planning.

The next action is to develop and hold a broadband stakeholder roundtable, something ATIC had done periodically in the past. The next leadership team meeting will be held in the near future to begin to address details and planning. There remain issues as to how we would acquire names and contact vectors of potential roundtable participants. ATIC and GAZEL should cooperate on merging their respective mailing lists into a common CRM platform to enable, manage, and streamline stakeholder communication.

A separate means of vendor engagement by ATIC should be developed in parallel and will be on the agenda for future ATIC consideration and action.

3.3 Rural Community Outreach (All)

There was no new report at this Board Meeting. Previously, Mark Goldstein reported on Bill Bolin's white paper and report to ATIC regarding rural communities in Arizona as well as Bill's observations and recommendations for rural broadband success and significant ATIC transformations in organizational structure and practices. Bill recommended that ATIC become a membership organization charging dues, event fees, and otherwise raising funds, allowing the hiring of an Executive Director and support staff functions while simultaneously becoming more active in developing and implementing projects, seeking and managing grants, producing RFPs, etc.

The general feeling as expressed by participating Board members was that we are not in a strong enough current position to enact some of these suggestions. Certainly, we could and should entertain and undertake some of the projects that require less heavy lifting, such as grant identification and brokering by utilizing Karen Ziegler's ADOA capabilities, while going forward as a volunteer organization. Jay Schlum suggested that Board Members and Associates should offer suggestions on improving our engagement and impact.

The Executive Committee committed to undertake further discussions of Bill's suggested pathways and report back to the Board, engaging in productive dialogue and consideration.

3.4 K12/GAZeL Education Report (Steve Peters, Nan Williams)

3.4.1 ATI Institute Renaming/Repurposing

Greater Arizona eLearning (GAZeL, <http://www.gazel.org/>) has mostly completed its transition into a 501(c)(3) non-profit by reforming under the Arizona Telecom & Information Institute (ATI Institute) corporate shell. The repurposed organization would remain an option for managing future broadband grant opportunities in conjunction with ATIC.

3.4.2 Labster Virtual Laboratory Simulations Consortium

GAZeL, ATIC, and AzTEA have established a project to explore interest, feasibility and a strategy to develop a statewide partnership and funding mechanism with Labster, the Virtual Laboratory Simulation Education Group based in Denmark, and K-12 schools, universities and community colleges to provide appropriate Labster virtual online lab modules for all educational institutions in Arizona for free or at a low cost. Sam Butcher of Labster visited Arizona last June among other Labster higher ed visits here. There is now a demonstration project with ASU and Google. The feasibility of forming a consortium to provide Labster curricula throughout all of Arizona is being explored. Steve has constructed a working website for this project at <https://gazel-labster.weebly.com/> and will shortly restart efforts to advance.

3.4.3 Generation Yes Computer Science & IT Training Programs

Steve continues to explore partnering with Dennis Harper of GenYes (<https://www.genyes.org/>) regarding working with banks on Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) which has evolved to allow funding for schools with the goal of their

supporting broadband buildouts for nonprofits and schools. The national program involves billions of dollars.

3.4.4 Other Innovative Learning Collaborative Initiatives for 2019

The Arizona Technology in Education Association (AzTEA) held a recent STEM unconference in three Arizona regions and will hold their “IT & C&I Leadership Symposium: Building Bridges for Student Learning” event on March 8th at Dysart Unified School District Office in Surprise. They’re also hosting a conference with ISTE on Understanding the K-12 Computer Science Framework on March 30th in Paradise Valley. See <http://aztea.org/> for details and registration.

Pima Community College held an edtech event last week with some 25 attendees. GAZeL is planning for a conference on disruptive learning later this year at a Tucson venue TBD including a planning exercise for schools and district implementation and a closing reception. Science Foundation Arizona and/or Helios Project may support.

Steve has also been in dialogue with Adonis Trujillo of Microsoft who is interested in our initiatives and has some funding available. Microsoft has a number of projects with the University of Arizona including data center activities and recently purchased a large track of land in Goodyear presumably for data center operations.

The Arizona Technology Council’s Arizona SciTech Foundation has been renamed as the SciTech Institute (<http://scitechinstitute.org/>). Cisco has recently donated \$150,000 to them to support the High School Chief Science Officers (CSO) program (<http://scitechinstitute.org/programs/chief-science-officers/>).

The GAZeL Board has been developing their priorities and adopted plans for the Innovative Learning Collaborative for 2019 including:

- Labster Virtual Laboratory Simulations Consortium (In partnership with ATIC)
- Generation Yes Computer Science and IT Training programs
- Collaborative Professional Development

- Innovation Labs/Makerspaces Network
- State and Local Innovative Learning Plans
- Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network (In partnership with ATIC)
- Federal Reserve Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) Digital Equity/Digital Divide funding opportunities (In partnership with ATIC)

3.5 Arizona State Library (Holly Henley, Mala Muralidharan)

Holly will attend the ALA Winter conference in Seattle in January and was on a panel to represent “digital inclusion” work, such as the mobile hot-spot lending program. Last year 9 Arizona libraries including 3 tribal libraries participated with plans for 12 libraries this year.

State Library helped facilitate the Navajo-Gila Counties Consortium of schools and libraries, as well as Apache, Santa Cruz, and Yavapai County consortiums. Based on difficulties with approval, Navajo and Gila Counties may refile separately. The e-rate filing deadline for this cycle is March 27 and Arizona seeks to optimize our utilization of special ACC and ADE funds leveraging the FCC special infrastructure program expiring this year. Library's focus this year was Category 2 funding. Mala's detailed e-rate report follows:

Mala Muralidharan's E-rate Report for the ATIC Board MEETING on February 13th

Application Window the Funding Year (FY) 2019 FCC Form 471 application filing window will open on Wednesday, January 16, 2019, at 12:00 noon EST and will close on Wednesday, March 27, 2019, at 11:59 p.m. EDT.

Arizona Commerce Authority will allocate \$3 million of the total Arizona Competes Fund deposit to the matching fund towards increasing broadband penetration throughout the state's most unserved and underserved rural areas. This Rural Development Broadband Grants program is available for FY2020. Grants will be awarded to local partnerships or ventures with clear and achievable plans to improve broadband services in one or more underserved rural areas.

Category 1 – Internet to the door. Fiber buildout funding is available for one more year from USAC. Arizona State Match is also available for this cycle. Several projects underway. Although these may seem small, the pockets that did not have a backhaul and adequate middle mile capacity are getting connected and this will enable availability and affordability in the future. Backhaul projects

The State Library is working with libraries as they continue their application to increase the bandwidth this year. We have one more year when the Arizona USF funds will be available. There is approx \$1 Million left of the original \$11 Million State Match that was approved and an anticipated additional \$3 Million if the Governor’s budget proposal for this survives the legislative process.

Category 2 – Internal Connections:

Wireline Competition Bureau Chief’s report to FCC Commissioners for Recommendations for Category 2 - Modernizing the E-Rate Program for Schools and Libraries WC Docket 13-184 . The discussions were whether to continue a budget-based funding or go back to the 2-5 funding.

Conclusions and Recommendations

The Bureau concludes, based on participation rates, budget utilization, and other data in this Report, that **the category two budget approach** is a clear improvement over the two-in-five rules approach. It meets the goals of ensuring that schools and Libraries have robust Wi-Fi networks thus enhancing educational opportunities for students and library patrons, and the potential for these networks to close the digital divide.

- a. More Schools and libraries participated, resulting in a more equitable distribution of funding that better approximates the makeup of E-Rate applicants, in comparison to the distribution under the two-in-five rules approach where funding disproportionately went to urban schools.
- b. Funding is available to entities in urban and rural areas, and across all discount bands, distributed to more applicants, in a more equitable and predictable manner.
- c. Applicants have flexibility to determine how best to use funding i.e. which year and not do upgrades twice in 5 years.
- d. Applicants have had access to category 2 funding every year, and no requests have been denied due to insufficient funding. By contrast, under the two-in-five rules approach, a small number of applicants exhausted available funding, with most applicants receiving no funding. 43% of schools and 23% of libraries each year now receive category two funding as compared to 10% of applicants under the two-in-five rules.
- e. Budget amount was sufficient except for schools and libraries at the funding floor, as well as libraries outside of highly-concentrated urban areas. Low total budgets may be deterring

participation by these entities because the administrative costs of participating outweigh the benefits of doing so.

Recommendations:

1. The Commission retain the category two budget approach instead of going back to the over the two-in-five rules, the Bureau does not recommend a return to the two-in-five rules approach.
2. The Commission consider some targeted changes to the budgets moving forward such as an increase in the funding floor, to the extent that it finds that insufficient funding is deterring entities at the funding floor and rural libraries from participating.
These recommendations are supported by the data the Bureau reviewed and are also consistent with the Public Notice comments.

3.6 Telehealth (Janet Major)

Janet mentioned that the U of A will have a Telehealth Pavilion at the Metropolitan Education Commission's Key to Employment for the 21st Century: Industry, Technology, Education & Career Symposium & Expo in Tucson on February 7th. Details <http://www.metedu.org/k2e-registration-form/>.

Janet recommended that GAZEL become a member of the U.S. Distance Learning Association (USDLA, <https://usdla.org/>) at a cost of \$500 annually.

3.7 Government Affairs (Mike Keeling, Mark Goldstein)

Mike Keeling reported on this year's SB 1089 Bill that would open all services for telemedicine participation with appropriate reimbursement and include ACHSS. It has gone through Senate Committee and seems to have good support. Mark asked if monitoring wearable consumer devices (e.g., Apple Watch) fall under the category of telemedicine. Mike responded that those services generally fall under telehealth instead of telemedicine and will follow up with AZTC. Mike and Mark also expect more bills regarding 5G wireless facilities siting and deployment.

The Arizona Technology Council's (AZTC) Public Policy Guide for 2019 has been published including significant ATIC contributions to its broadband sections and can be downloaded at <https://www.aztechcouncil.org/arizona-technology-council-public-policy-guide/>. Beyond the recommendations found in the AZTC Guide, ATIC would additionally like to see the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC) expand the use of AUSF funds beyond the e-rate matching program that is sunseting to other rural broadband purposes and for the Arizona Department of Education's broadband fund to be refreshed with additional \$ from year to year.

4 Information and Action Plans

4.1 ATIC New Website Status & Outlook (All)

Steve Peters prototyped a replacement ATIC website on the Weebly platform. The completed website refresh was completed and cutover to which a number of members contributed ideas and content. You can find the relaunched site at the normal URL <http://www.arizonatele.org/>.

Some background information seems to have gotten lost in the conversion from Weebly's subdomain to the normal ATIC URL which Steve has committed to restore. Mark also has committed to building out the repository of ATIC reference and historical documents.

4.2 ATIC Domains, Mailing List & CRM (All)

Mark has current credentials for the GoDaddy account holding ATIC-related domain names and can now modify the records including contact information and redirection of DNS as needed.

Mark reiterated that we need to rebuild our mailing list likely in cooperation with GAZeL and has begun discussions with Steve Peters on how best to accomplish this. Mark is currently utilizing SendinBlue (<https://www.sendinblue.com/>) for publishing his monthly Arizona Technology and Economic Development Events calendar.
