1.4. Treasurer's Report

Ron Schott, Treasurer, circulated via email the Desert Financial Credit Union report with account and transaction details for Board reference, which are included at the back of these Minutes. This does not include the \$445.79 check Ron sent to Mark for the GoDaddy, Weebly web hosting and PO Box bills he paid. Ron reported that current funds on hand total \$5480.91 after those recent expenses and includes all payments to Steve Peters for coordinating the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force through December 2020.

Mark recounted what Steve Peters has accomplished as a coordinator for AZBSN dating back to the first successful event at Rio Salado Community College and two subsequent webinars. After the pandemic arrived, ATIC approved paying Steve \$800 per month to manage the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force with the stipulation that this funding be reimbursed to ATIC as its first priority when AZBSN receives sponsorship or grant funding. Steve's funding of \$800 per month extended through December 2020.

Five payments of \$1,000 had been made to Steve Peters for support of the AZBSN prior to February 29, 2020, which were not to be repaid to ATIC, and an additional \$8,000 (\$800 per month) has been paid to Steve for his work on the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force for March through December 2020. It was agreed that this \$8,000 would be immediately repaid to ATIC from sponsorships or grants which the AZBSN receives as Steve solicits funding.

Mark had noted at our previous Board meeting that we must remember that AZBSN is separate from ATIC. At that time Mark stated there are three potential sources of future ATIC funding: AZBSN sponsorships, ATIC sponsorships, and ATIC grant opportunities.

Mark said we need a refresh of funds, which includes ATIC sponsorships as well as AZBSN sponsorships. We need to initiate a financial campaign for sponsors and other sources of funding. There may be some pandemic-related special grants available. Mark has spoken to Bob Jacobson about raising funding for ATIC as well as to Kirk Busch about ATIC funding.

Steve is finalizing an AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force sponsorship package and he said several people on this call are targets for sponsorship. The letter will be sent to them shortly.

Steve noted that the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force needs to identify what tasks from the Task Force report recommendations that it will undertake to implement which would need funding support.

1.5. ATIC Board Membership Considerations

Mark noted that we currently have twenty-one Board members and he would like to add Andrew Bevington, Director of Education and Business Partnerships at the Pima County Superintendent of Schools Office.

3.1.3. ACA Broadband Strategy & ATIC Role/Support

Jeff Sobotka, State Broadband Director at the Arizona Commerce Authority (ACA), reported that the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) has received \$1.6 billion in the federal stimulus to allocate nationally for broadband activities. NTIA assists in setting the ground rules for government grants in the broadband arena and is creating a position within NTIA to coordinate the various federal broadband funding programs. Our Congressman Tom O'Halleran is a good contact point for information on this. The rules are in the process of being written and NTIA seems to be flexible. Jeff has asked them to do away with the matching funds requirement for communities because that often prohibits potential candidates from applying. The Navajo Nation and the Colorado River Indian Tribes (CRIT) are engaged in efforts to tap into the \$1 billion grant funding allocated for tribes. Jeff is working with the NTIA on a series of monthly workshops (webinars/town halls) to get broadband to rural Arizona communities, and will work with ATIC and the AZBSN on planning these workshops. These workshops are scheduled to begin in March and will focus on guidance for grant writing.

ACA has applied for federal funding for the State Broadband Plan, and the federal government is looking for counties or groups of counties to apply for federal funds. \$10 million in funding for the state Rural Broadband Development Grants program (up from \$3 million in the previous budget) is expected to be included in the Governor's budget to be announced on Friday. The maximum grant size is \$1 million. Jeff is working with all the carriers to get them involved, and Arizona was the only state that did not get sued by a carrier in the last round of states' broadband grants programs. The Policies Manual for FY2022 is due to be published soon and Jeff has been promoting broadband to the Governor's Office and to legislators emphasizing its relationship to the state highway program. The Governor's Office has various broadband proposals for fiscal year 2021-22, and it is important that there be bipartisan cooperation from state legislators to take advantage of federal and state grants for broadband infrastructure. ADOT deployment of state-owned fiber is underway along I-17 from Sunset Point

to Flagstaff, ADOT deployment of fiber along I-19 from Tucson to Nogales will occur soon thereafter, and the Governor will likely be proposing additional state fiber deployment along I-40. The Sun Corridor Network (SCN) has been involved in this ADOT middle-mile fiber deployment effort and Jeff is in discussions with the SCN and the Arizona Department of Education about how to use this ADOT fiber. There is also work going on with fiber redundancy infrastructure from Payson to Phoenix.

Mark noted that a proposed \$6.25 billion in state block grant funding for broadband disappeared from the federal government stimulus package. Jeff said that would have been transformative for Arizona and would have provided about \$150 - \$200 million for Arizona broadband, but objections were raised about insufficient oversight of such state grants. Mark commented that state block grant funding may come in the next federal stimulus package. Jeff added that the current federal stimulus funding to support broadband funding for low-income households supports provision of existing service provider services but not new broadband infrastructure. Rick Gibson commented that his firm Sustainability Partners could provide matching funds for broadband infrastructure projects and is certified as a state vendor.

Steve said Lea Márquez Peterson of the Arizona Corporation Commission is looking at repurposing Arizona Universal Service Funds (AUSF) towards broadband for high-cost rural communities. Lea is now Chair of the ACC and the ACC has a new docket open for AUSF modification. ATIC or the AZBSN task force could make recommendations on how to best use AUSF funding to support broadband in rural areas. Jeff responded he will talk to Lea about potential new broadband uses for the AUSF. Currently the money from the AUSF all goes to Frontier which does not make sense, but the AUSF has restrictions on how the funding can be used.

3.2. Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network (Steve Peters)

3.2.1. ASBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Updates

Steve Peters reported on the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force and noted “digital” includes not only broadband Internet access, but also devices, digital content, professional development, digital literacy and technical support. The Task Force meets every Monday morning and is attended by about 30-40 representatives from broadband service providers, technology companies, state and local government agencies, educational organizations, non-profit organizations and consultants. Steve briefly summarized the meetings that have been held as well as the summary reports produced and distributed after each meeting. Steve noted that updates are provided at the weekly task force meetings from the State Broadband Director at the Arizona Commerce Authority (ACA), the Arizona Department of Education (ADE), the Arizona State Library, the Sun Corridor

Network (SCN) and the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC).

Steve announced that the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Report and Recommendations has been released and is available to be forwarded to appropriate parties. There is a landing page for the Report and one for the Task Force, both of which have been updated. People can download the Report from the landing page. Steve has sent a cover letter to task force participants (including the ATIC Board) that they can use to distribute the task force recommendations report to their constituents.

Steve has been working with Insight on a media release for the task force recommendations report and this media release has been sent to task force participants and posted on the task force website today. Insight will distribute this media release shortly.

Steve said the ATIC and GAZEL database needs to be updated but he has not received input from anyone. He emphasized that he urgently needs updated contact information. Key entities that need to be contacted include the League of Arizona Cities and Towns, AzTEA, Sun Corridor Network among a host of others. Steve asked Jeff Sobotka if he could provide his list of contacts.

Steve has been working with Karen Ziegler and others to generate a sponsorship funding request package for the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force. This funding request will be sent to potential AZBSN sponsors shortly. Steve emphasized that a fund-raising activity to implement task force recommendations and other AZBSN activities needs to be initiated.

He said there is a need to schedule meetings with key policy makers such as the Governor's Office and Superintendent of Public Instruction at ADE to review the recommendations and to develop a strategy to continue collaborating with current and new participants. Some tasks will require the State to take the lead while others can be led by the task force members. The task force may establish project teams to implement recommendations. The next step is for the Task Force to identify what tasks need to be pursued and prioritized.

3.2.2. Marketing the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Report

Another need is to develop a publicity and marketing campaign for distributing the report to all the relevant organizations. A marketing committee needs to be created to plan and execute such a campaign, and the existing database of Arizona economic development leaders and decision-makers needs to be cleaned up and expanded.

3.2.3. New Initiatives to Carry out the Report's Recommendations

Steve wants to form a planning committee to start some initiatives and said we need to identify what can be implemented immediately. Henry stated we need to get clear feedback from major stakeholders on what recommendations the task force should undertake next and how this will be funded. Steve replied to Henry that we need to identify what are highest priorities for implementation, and Mark commented that we should get feedback from key stakeholders such as Ben Blink in the Governor's Office and Jeff Sobotka, as well as others. Henry asked about Bob Jacobson's involvement as the ATIC Lobbyist, and Mark responded this is not clear yet.

3.2.4. Return to Outreach Activities with Newsletters & Webinars

Steve said the highest priority is to get the task force report with cover letter out to key stakeholders.

Mark would like to return to public events and engage a broader community. Steve is updating the ATIC Excel mailing list after which we may want to use Sendinblue for e-mail distributions.

3.3. Greater Arizona Educational Leadership (Steve Peters, Nan Williams)

3.3.1. Arizona Technology in Education Association (AzTEA)

Nan Williams serves on the EDTech Committee for the Arizona Department of Education (ADE) which is rewriting the Educational Technology standards this year.

Nan is also participating in the ADE Technology Task Force on the Digital Learning Subcommittee.

She is also participating in the ISTE policy group on digital equity access.

Steve commented that there are multiple organizations involved with the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force that are providing devices to school districts or families, and the task force will be creating a subcommittee for these organization to collaborate more effectively on this.

3.3.2. Labster Virtual Laboratory Simulations Consortium

As noted in recent reports, the AZBSN Task Force report is recommending that a virtual laboratories consortium for the state be explored, but not necessarily be limited to Labster technology.

3.3.3. GAZEL Innovative Learning Collaborative Initiatives

No report.

3.4. Arizona State Library (Holly Henley, Mala Muralidharan)

Mala reported that the E-rate RFP window which opened in November is still active. The E-rate application window for the fiscal 2021-22 year opens on January 15 and remains open until March 25. New E-rate applications must be filed every year, and there are about 5000 applicants in Arizona so this is a busy time for Mala and Milan Eaton (the ADE E-rate director).

She noted that work is proceeding on rule changes for the next cycle to enable approvals and release of E-rate funds to occur earlier, and expand the list of eligible services such as security equipment and Wi-Fi on school buses as well as work with the FCC to gain access to dark fiber. NTIA needs to develop rules for accessing the funds in the COVID-19 Relief Bill. Steve asked if Mala is working with Kajeet, and Mala responded that they are working with Kajeet on connecting their hotspots to antennas on book mobiles.

The IMLS budget has some money in it for innovation in digital literacy skills and to help with IT skills.

Ian Hathcock stated the FCC Lifeline program is important to service providers and asked if Internet to the Home will be supported by E-rate. Mala said it will be handled under the USAC umbrella not under the Lifeline program, but the rules are not specified yet.

Holly Henley reported that the State Library's next round of LSTA subgrants is due in March and she is looking forward to receiving applications from libraries for projects that will improve digital access.

LibTAP Digital Navigators have supported more than 500 calls to date. Twenty-five percent of these calls involve one-on-one assistance in learning how to complete a task online or with a device.

LSTA grants:

The State Library's next round of LSTA subgrants is due in March. We're looking forward to receiving applications from libraries for projects that will improve digital access.

E-rate Improvements

According to Education Superhighway, over 95% of schools now have access to fiber and are receiving much lower prices (per megabit) than 7 years ago. In fact, the demand for E-rate support has remained stable and well below the \$4 billion cap in part because of the efficiencies introduced in 2014.

While these successes are remarkable, there are three areas that need further improvement:

1. The processing of E-rate applications could be expedited and streamlined.
2. **Expand the list of eligible services** to provide support for **Wi-Fi on school buses**, especially useful in rural area till we have the fiber build-out completed.
3. **Requesting that network security equipment and services be funded as there is a growing need for secure networks** by making cybersecurity eligible for funding.
4. E-rate program should facilitate remote learning at home and other locations other than the school or library campus. **E-rate program can address part of this “digital divide” on an ongoing basis by allowing the use of dormant capacity in E-rate funded connections to be shared with the surrounding community.**

COVID-19 relief package and Libraries

1. The COVID-19 relief package passed by Congress includes **\$285 M to NTIA for broadband for Minority-serving Institutions and the "anchor communities" surrounding them.** . NTIA will have to develop rules for this program in 45 days (early February and send it out).
2. The COVID relief bill does however provide direct assistance for many of the community members libraries serve. In addition to the individual \$600 stimulus checks, **the legislation provides emergency benefits to cover the cost of broadband for qualifying low-income households and those that include recently unemployed individuals, with additional benefits for households on Tribal lands – not part of E-rate but is likely to be under the USAC (Universal Services Administrative Company) umbrella.**
3. The bill also revives the Paycheck Protection Program forgivable loans for qualified businesses. **Many library organizations that have 501(c)(6) status are now eligible for the program.**

4. The FY2021 budget includes a **\$5 million increase from the previous year for the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS)**, including **\$2 million for the Library Services and Technology Act**. Despite threats to eliminate the agency completely for four consecutive years, funding for the IMLS **has increased from \$231 million to \$257 million**. Steady gains in IMLS funding in recent years have fueled innovative programs that address community needs, ranging from early literacy to digital skills, from employment assistance to small business development.
5. The FY2021 budget also includes increases for National Library of Medicine (+\$5.8 million), National Endowment for the Arts (+\$5.3 million), National Endowment for the Humanities (+\$5.3 million), and Library of Congress (+\$32 million).

Janet was unable to attend as she was providing technical support for a webinar. but she submitted the following report.

3.6. Government Affairs (Mike Keeling, Mark Goldstein)

Mark noted that the Governor's State of the State address was delivered on January 11th.

Mike Keeling said the Governor's budget coming on January 15th should have

some expansion bills on telemedicine and telehealth. Mark added that nursing, consulting and interstate licensing is also part of the AZTC recommendations. Mike Keeling remarked that such interstate licensing compacts are very important during COVID-19 because there are COVID hotspots in different areas. Steve said that digital access and equity are also important for telehealth as they are for education and there are many seniors and low-income people that don't have devices and the digital literacy to use telehealth services.

As reported in previous minutes, Henry Goldberg suggested that ATIC should discuss its role in lobbying for recommendations in the AZBSN Task Force Report. Mark said ATIC needs to address that topic early on before the legislature convenes in January. Mark stated that ATIC/AZBSN has had discussions with Jeff Sobotka, Lea Márquez Peterson, and Ben Blink.

According to Steve, Bob Jacobson is resigning as Lobbyist, Mark will look into this. Mike Keeling said he has prepared previous quarterly and annual ATIC Lobbyist reports for the Secretary of State, and he asked for people interested in becoming the ATIC Lobbyist to contact him. Mark stated that AZTC has their own lobbyist but they do not focus on all issues relevant to ATIC.
