1.4. Treasurer's Report

Ron Schott, Treasurer reported that current funds on hand as of May 11, 2020 total approximately \$12996 after recent expenses. Ron circulated the Desert Financial Credit Union report with account and transaction details for Board reference, which are included at the back of these Minutes.

Five payments of \$1,000 have been made to Steve Peters for support of the AZBSN prior to February 29, 2020 and an additional \$4,000 has been encumbered for payments of \$800 per month for March through July. ATIC has paid Steve Peters \$2400 for March, April and May and two more monthly payments remain.

Without any current monetary sponsors, sustainability remains a concern. One of Steve Peters' primary tasks for ATIC in coordinating the AZBSN is to determinedly seek sponsors, grants, and other sources of revenue going forward.

Mark still needs to check the P.O. Box in Tempe for any recent bills or correspondence. The ATIC D & O Insurance is due to be paid.

1.5. ATIC Board Membership Considerations

There has been limited activity in the last few months. The Board currently has 22 members. We continue to need to expand participation with direct State of Arizona representation, as well as a focus on rural and native stakeholder representation, especially from the economic development community, as well as representatives from municipal, county, and higher education CIOs, plus of course stronger broadband industry participation going forward. Mark is engaging several prospects in that regard.

2. Informational Presentations

2.1. Karen Ziegler/AZDOA - FirstNet, e911, AZNET & Telecom Carrier Contracts

Karen gave an oral report rather than a slide presentation. Regarding FirstNet, she apologized for not being able to share maps or tower locations because AT&T considers that to be proprietary information.

2.1.1. **FirstNet**

FirstNet currently has 12,400+ lines in Arizona serving some 195 agencies, which can be accessed from vehicular and hand-held devices. Several towers are being built in rural locations including the Yuma area. Contracts have been finalized with CommNet and Smith Bagley to upgrade towers to include Band 14 and LTE coverage in the northeastern part of Arizona in Apache county and neighboring communities. Some new towers are being built in in the southeastern regions of Maricopa County to serve the areas around Chandler and Gilbert. AT&T is building out more than forty new towers beyond those that are being upgraded. After a National Association of State Budget Officers (NASBO) 60-day extension to renegotiate pricing with AT&T, FirstNet hopes to have a longer-term agreement finalized by August.

In response to a question about co-location, since AT&T owns the new towers an entity would have to ask AT&T if co-location would be allowable. However existing towers with upgrades would likely be sharable.

Most of the hand-sets are generic Apple and Android devices some with push-totalk capability, although there are some specialized push-to-talk radios that are much more advanced than current radios. The Arizona Department of Administration (ADOA) is pushing to expand FirstNet at the state level to include education and outreach efforts. There are two years remaining to complete the five-year buildout, primarily in northeastern Arizona including the Navajo Nation. There is really good FirstNet coverage in Maricopa County and western Arizona.

2.1.2. e911 or Emergency Services IP Network (ESInet).

The state's e911 next-generation 911 network will support voice, text, and video communications. An RFP will be released in July for a statewide IP backbone network, based on fiber with redundancy for reliability, called the Emergency Services IP Network or "ESINet". The contract is expected to be in place by December 2020. The ESINet will leverage the state government AZNet backbone network for which a contract has been awarded to CenturyLink.)

The rationale for an IP-based network is based on the requirement to support text, video and data transmission and to do load-balancing to meet the demands of high-volume peak activity and to compensate for unexpected outages. When some Public Safety Answering Phones (PSAP) had to shut down because of COVID-19 traffic an IP-based network supporting load balancing would have been a great help. PSAP call centers will use IP Phones. The shift from analog to digital will improve service and redundancy.

The RFP leaves it up to the bidders to decide how they are going to integrate with the existing systems to do asset sharing. There are about 83 PSAPs statewide.

One other procurement, Telecom Carrier Services, is in progress. The contract has been issued and is in place. It is a multi-carrier contract. Mala has a list of the carriers.

Karen noted that FirstNet could provide an emergency backup for certain outages (if it was not a backbone cut).

2.1.3. Other State Broadband Activities.

Karen also stated that Apache County received an ACA Rural Broadband Development Grant for Community Broadband Planning in the area around Eagar, Springerville and a few other locations.

The Grants Office (led by Matt Hanson) is no longer under ADOA and has been moved to the Governor's Budget Office.

In Jeff Sobotka's absence, Mark noted Jeff provides regular updates on his State Broadband Director activities at the weekly AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force meetings. Mark also added that Mohave County Electric Cooperative is doing a fiber buildout to enable broadband service.

Steve Peters said Jeff may be hiring an intern and grant-writer to assist him. The Governor's proposal for an additional \$10 million in rural broadband development grant funding, managed by ACA, will be considered by the State legislature.

3.2.1. AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Updates

Steve Peters reported on the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force and noted "digital" includes not only broadband Internet access, but also devices, digital content, professional development, and technical support. The Task Force meets every week and is attended by 35-40 representatives from broadband service providers, MSS, Insight, various consultants and numerous state agencies. He briefly summarized the meetings that have been held as well as the summary reports produced and distributed following each meeting.

Four subcommittees to make recommendations have been created: (1) the Education and Library subcommittee is led by Nan Williams, Executive Director, Arizona Technology In Education Association, and Mala Muralidharan, E-rate Administrator for Public Libraries, Arizona State Library; (2) the Funding and Resources subcommittee is led by Lea Marquez Peterson, Commissioner of the Arizona Corporation Commission; (3) the Technology subcommittee will be led by Tom Mehlert, Executive Director of AZ StRUT, and Steve Hill, President of the Satellite Broadcasting & Communications Association; and (4) the Communities subcommittee, will be led by Alan Pruitt and John Lucas.

Nan and Mala reported that the Education and Libraries subcommittee has three major goals: (1) The collection of reliable and useful data for decision-making, such as the availability and location of public Wi-Fi access points. (2) The providing of technical support, such as a library help desk of a general nature that provides direction on how to perform various tasks, such as: How do I apply for unemployment? How do I access telemedicine resources? How do I solve this problem I am having with my device? Support of a more technically oriented help desk is also needed on how to resolve problems related to technology and automation. (3) How to optimize and share resources among agencies and organizations such as the Arizona Department of Education (ADE), the numerous state libraries, the Arizona State Land Department (ASLD) and others.

ASLD has constructed a useful map on public Wi-Fi availability statewide. The National Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Foundation have teamed up to launch Every Student Connected, an initiative to raise awareness of the difficulties students have when lacking digital access for distance learning. The subcommittee met with Labster which offers numerous simulation models that can serve as physical laboratory replacements. She noted

that ADE is collecting valuable data regarding guidelines on safe reopening of schools. The Arizona BioIndustry Association (AZBIO) has compiled a list of useful safety precautions for desks and keyboards and safe reopening practices for public access computers (sanitation, antimicrobial keyboards, gesture interfaces). Lenovo has provided information about safety keyboards. The Mohave County Education Service Cooperative has master contracts for Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). The subcommittee will create a list of potential partners to complement Mark's list of sanitation vendors.

The new State Master Contract has been published and is ready for use for E-rate contracts. Arizona has received about \$20 million of the \$94 million applied for in E-rate grant applications.

Mala noted that the implementation of the Arizona CARES Act funding via IMLS for \$64 million in the three different categories of grants is nearing completion. This includes CARES Express Grants for chromebooks and germ buster kits, CARES Expanded grants of \$4000 for each library for hotspots, tablets, security cameras, portable shelters for shade in parking lots, mobile printing services and CARES Supplemental Grants for partnerships for virtual museum tours.

Mala noted that the Cisco project to provide Wi-Fi boosters to five libraries' parking lots is also nearly complete..

Mark noted the FCC temporarily relaxed E-rate policies to allow Wi-Fi to be extended to school and library parking lots. Mala noted that the waiver does not extend outside the school boundaries or properties to neighborhoods but is approved for school buses wherever they park.

Steve Peters added that some people from the Education and Libraries subcommittee and Technology subcommittee met with Labster on June 9th to discuss potential for collaboration with Arizona educational institutions.

The Education and Libraries subcommittee meets via teleconference every Thursday at 9:30 a.m. and all are welcome to attend.

The Technology subcommittee has begun to meet and will identify what technologies are available and how they can support the needs for education, libraries, and communities. Steve reported that the initial meeting focused on AzSTRUT and a presentation given by Tom Mehlert, its Director. Steve said the team also intends to look at case studies of mesh networks, satellite broadband and other solution options.

The Technology subcommittee meets remotely every Tuesday at 9:30 a.m. and all are welcome to attend.

Lea Marquez Peterson leads the Funding and Resources subcommittee which is considering various funding and donation sources and how to help in the grant writing process. Steve observed that although Jeff Sobotka, Mala and others are focused on federal and state government funding, it is important to remember that other funding sources are also available.

Toward that end Mark Goldstein has put together a valuable extensive list of

broadband and grant-writing consultants that is posted on the COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force website. The subcommittee also wants to look at the possibility of setting up a fund for organizations to hire consultants to write grants.

Jeff Sobotka, Mala and Milan Eaton need more people to assist them with grant application work. The subcommittee is investigating other sources of funding as well, such as the Federal Reserve Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) funding. The Arizona Corporation Commission is considering transitioning the Universal Service Fund money to support broadband.

The Funding and Resources subcommittee meets remotely every Friday at 10:00 a.m. and all are welcome to attend.

The Communities subcommittee will address small businesses, senior citizens and other community needs.

3.2.2. **AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Short Term Deliverables**Mark noted that this category is a new addition to the agenda.

After noting that ADE has its own Technology task force Steve provided an outline of his thoughts about what the deliverables might be. Mark said that Steve's outline is essentially a first step toward a set of recommendations.

Henry Goldberg emailed Steve that the subcommittees should have a deadline to make preliminary recommendations in July, and they should include an estimate of the costs of the proposals and whether the necessary data can be secured.

Mark said we probably cannot estimate all the costs involved in meeting needs identified by the Education and Libraries subcommittee. Henry said we at least need to provide insight into how to estimate the costs.

Mark said we should tell the teams what we are looking to achieve and that the end product should be a preliminary recommendations document of about 10 - 15 pages.

Mark says we should strive to have a draft preliminary recommendations document by mid-July and a final document by July 31, with a caveat admitting that it needs to be refined. Timing is important. Cost estimates may need to be deferred to other experts.

3.2.3. Funding for ATIC

Mark noted ATIC needs a refresh of its funding and has brough this to the attention of Lea Marquez Peterson's Funding and Resources Subcommittee of the COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force. Steve noted he is working on an AZBSN Sponsorship package which will be distributed in the near future

3.3.1. Arizona Technology in Education Association (AzTEA)

Nan reported that AzTEA just finished the eSports series and is planning for next

year. Hopefully, they will have a schedule out soon.

Steve said a meeting was held yesterday to discuss how best to collaborate with Labster and what Labster is doing now in the K12, university and community college spaces.

<u>Library Tech Helpline</u>: Based on NDIA's <u>Digital Navigator</u> Model- Assistance provided free of cost to patrons (project funded by IMLS) examples of assistance include getting people signed up with low-cost Internet and devices, directing to online training, basic tech support and navigating through the website and forms and using library staff as they know the resources available.

Insight has a Help-Desk Model for education and private sector which they will speak about.

IMLS CARES Funding for Libraries: Holly Henley, State Librarian, summarized the redistribution of the IMLS Cares funding received. The Arizona State Library awarded 51 grants of \$4000 each to Arizona public, school, tribal and academic libraries as part of a second CARES Act funding opportunity. The federal CARES Act funding for libraries was made possible by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

Mala's State Library Report for the June 10th ATIC Meeting (Continued)

Libraries receiving grants will use the funds in a variety of ways to support their communities. Examples include:

- Wi-Fi mobile hotspots.
- laptops and tablets.
- computer with video editing software to enable virtual programs.
- security cameras for parking lots where Wi-Fi is available when the building is closed.
- portable shelters such as tents or awnings in library parking lots to provide shade for materials pick-up and/or Wi-Fi use.
- · virtual reality devices.
- mobile printing services.

Libraries from 13 counties submitted applications and at least one library from each of those counties received an award. In the State Library's first CARES Act funding opportunity, 65 libraries from 13 counties were selected to receive a total of 392 Chromebooks, 47 video equipment packages, and 224 sanitation kits. A third funding opportunity will focus on library partnerships with museums and workforce development organizations.

Cares Supplemental is the final part of this IMLS Cares grant that will focus on library partnerships with museums and workforce development organizations. The State Library is working on a sample project with the Arizona Capitol Museum for a virtual tours. We hope to partner with Museum Association of Arizona in getting the word out about this model project. Applications will go out later this summer. The funding period ends Sept. 30, 2021
