1.4. Treasurer's Report

Ron Schott, Treasurer reported that current funds on hand as of July 7, 2020, total \$9249.11 after recent expenses. This includes payment for the Directors & Officers Insurance with Country Mutual, ATIC's membership in the Arizona Technology Council and Arizona Corporation Commission fee. Ron circulated the Desert Financial Credit Union report with account and transaction details for Board reference, which are included at the back of these Minutes.

Mark recounted what Steve Peters has accomplished as a coordinator for AZBSN dating back to the first successful event at Rio Salado Community College and two subsequent webinars. After the pandemic arrived, ATIC approved paying Steve \$800 per month to manage the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force with the stipulation that this funding be reimbursed to ATIC as its first priority when AZBSN receives sponsorship or grant funding. Steve's funding of \$800 per month extends through December 2020.

Five payments of \$1,000 had been made to Steve Peters for support of the AZBSN prior to February 29, 2020, which were not to be repaid to ATIC, and an additional \$4,000 (\$800 per month) has been paid to Steve for his work on the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force for March through July. Another \$4000 has been encumbered for payments to Steve for his continuing work managing the task force of \$800 per month for August through December. ATIC has paid Steve two \$800

payments for August and September. Three payments of \$800 each remain to be paid. In total, ATIC will have paid Steve Peters ten payments of \$800 per month for a total of \$8000 that it was agreed would be immediately repaid to ATIC from sponsorships or grants that the AZBSN receives as Steve solicits funding.

Steve said that four or five entities have expressed an interest in funding AZBSN.

Mark noted that we must remember that AZBSN is separate from ATIC. Mark stated there are three potential sources of future ATIC funding: AZBSN sponsorships, ATIC sponsorships, and ATIC grant opportunities. Mark said he is looking to Bob Jacobson to identify potential operational grants. Bob said he will spend some time getting commitments. Mark mentioned there may be some pandemic-related special grants available.

Steve stated once the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Recommendations Report is published, the next step will be to identify actions that AZBSN and ATIC may undertake. Mark stated there may be some project-specific grants that arise for accomplishing this.

Mark asked attendees and associates to identify anyone who wants to contribute funds to ATIC. These funds are needed if ATIC is to continue operating into 2021.

Steve said we should capture the contact information from new attendees in the Chat and they should also say if they want to participate in the AZBSN task force,

1.5. ATIC Board Membership Considerations

Mark reported that Melissa Armas has resigned from the Board, leaving the position of Board Secretary vacant. Mark called for volunteers and noted that Oris Friesen has been serving as the Acting Secretary.

Mark noted that Derek Masseth has accepted the invitation to become a Board Member. He is now the full-time Executive Director of the Sun Corridor Network (SCN) and is on leave from his position as Chief Technology Officer of the University of Arizona. Derek reviewed his duties at SCN which Is Arizona's research and education network, one of the youngest such networks in the nation. The SCN was founded by the University of Arizona eight years ago under the direction of then University of Arizona CIO Michelle Norin who was an ATIC Board member. There is interest in potentially connecting all Arizona educational entities to the SCN

MOTION: To nominate Derek Masseth to be a Member of the ATIC Board.

Mark noted that Sheri Bakker and Lynda Santoro, who had been on the list of prospective Board Members, are no longer with Century Link. Mark stated that ATIC is looking to add new Board members with particular interest in rural and tribal representatives.

3. Activity Reports

3.1. Arizona Broadband Strategic Plan & FirstNet (Jeff Sobotka)

3.1.1. Rural Community Outreach

In Jeff Sobotka's absence, Mark noted that Jeff provides regular updates on his State Broadband Director activities at the weekly AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force meetings. Jeff has been working with power companies, electric co-ops and communities around the state, and he co-chairs the Telehealth Broadband Action Team (BAT) with Nancy Rowe.

Mark noted that Jeff managed the Arizona Commerce Authority Rural Broadband Development Grants (RBDG) program funded for \$3 million by the state government in the last year. The Governor proposed \$10 million for this program in the next budget, and the AZBSN task force recommendations include recapitalizing this RBDG program. Steve added that Jeff has done an awesome job throughout the state by connecting and interacting with communities, always with a focus on securing more federal money, such as Economic Development Administration (EDA) grants, for the State. Alan Pruitt is also involved with this activity, which is highly competitive since Arizona competes with California for these funds.

Henry Goldberg noted that Jeff is involved with the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) in evaluating responses to its Request for Information (RFI) for public-private partnerships to develop and manage fiber middle mile infrastructure along Arizona highways to reach rural communities. Mark added that the Governor has already allocated \$40 million for fiber infrastructure along I-17 and I-19.

Bob Jacobson, a representative of small rural communities such as Patagonia where he lives, said he submitted comments to ADOT as a private citizen expressing his opinion that the RFI over-emphasizes the major cities as opposed to rural communities. He would like to see ADOT fiber along state highways reach as many rural communities as possible.

The Arizona Technology Council recently hosted a meeting with Ben Blink, Governor Ducey's Transportation and Technology Innovation Policy Advisor, where Mark, Jeff Sobotka and ACA executives, Steve Peters, Derek Masseth, Mike Keeling and Bob Jacobson participated. Noting that the middle mile and last mile infrastructure issues are billion dollar items, they recommended that a Broadband Authority be created to address such needs. In 2011 ATIC proposed creating just such an office as a companion bill to the Digital Arizona Highways Act. The AZBSN Task Force Recommendations Report now recommends a more

modern version of the Broadband Development Authority. This notion dates all the way back to 2005 with discussions at ATIC.

Bob Jacobson remarked that the meeting had been very instructive. Bob offered to research and pass along to Ben Blink what is being done in other states along these lines. The AZBSN stands in for a conglomeration of organizations dealing with such issues in Arizona. The onus in Arizona is on volunteer organizations such as AZBSN and ATIC among others. Steve Peters noted the AZBSN task force report is recommending the state establish a broadband office and an advisory committee.

3.1.2. FirstNet Status & Outlook

The FirstNet Grant is expiring. The Arizona Department of Administration (ADOA) is pushing to expand FirstNet at the state level to include education and outreach efforts. There are two years remaining to complete the five-year buildout, primarily in northeastern Arizona including the Navajo Nation. There is really good FirstNet coverage in Maricopa County and western Arizona.

Karen Ziegler is no longer with ADOA and nobody has been appointed to fill her role as Public Safety Program Manager. Lt. Colonel Tim Chung, Assistant Director - Technical Services Division at Arizona, Department of Public Safety (DPS), and Dave Faulkner, Senior Public Safety Advisor for the First Responder Network Authority, are the main FirstNet contact points in central Arizona but they don't speak for the entire state. The other FirstNet contacts are the federal government Department of Commerce National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) and the network builder AT&T.

3.1.3. ACA Broadband Strategy & ATIC Role/Support

No report.

3.2. Arizona Broadband Stakeholder Network (Steve Peters)

3.2.1. AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Updates

Steve Peters reported on the AZBSN COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force and noted "digital" includes not only broadband Internet access, but also devices, digital content, professional development, digital literacy and technical support. The Task Force meets every Monday morning and is attended by about 30-40 representatives from broadband service providers, technology companies, state and local government agencies, educational organizations, non-profit organizations and consultants. Steve briefly summarized the meetings that have been held as well as the summary reports produced and distributed following each meeting.

Steve noted that regular briefings on recent activity include reports from the Arizona Commerce Authority (ACA), the Arizona Department of Education (ADE), the Arizona State Libraries, the Sun Corridor Network (SCN) and the Arizona Corporation Commission (ACC).

There are four subcommittees that have contributed to the recommendations in

the task force recommendations document. They are: (1) the Education and Libraries subcommittee led by Nan Williams, Executive Director, Arizona Technology In Education Association (AzTEA), Mala Muralidharan, E-rate Administrator for Public Libraries, Arizona State Library and Nicole Umayam, Digital Inclusion Consultant, Arizona State Library; (2) the Funding and Resources subcommittee led by Lea Márquez Peterson, Commissioner of the Arizona Corporation Commission; (3) the Technology subcommittee led by John Kelly of Triadvocates and Steve Hill, President of the Satellite Broadcasting & Communications Association; and (4) the Communities subcommittee, led by Alan Pruitt and John Lucas. The Task Force is in the process of finalizing the recommendations report.

Steve briefly overviewed some of the recommendation areas in the report. Karen Ziegler and Oris Friesen worked on creating an Executive Summary and making the wording more clear. Mark noted the report will contain an Executive Summary and Table of Contents, and that he, John Kelly, and Steve Hill are creating broadband business models and technical solutions appendices for the report

Insight will be putting the final report into a professional-looking format for publication.

Nan said we were able to bring separate groups together and create new lines of communication. Steve hopes this can lead to a more permanent group of contributors. Steve stated that Insight told him the AZBSN Task Force report will be the most comprehensive they have seen of any state addressing COVID-19 digital access.

3.3. Greater Arizona Educational Leadership (Steve Peters, Nan Williams)

3.3.1. Arizona Technology in Education Association (AzTEA)

Nan reported on a "Tech 4 The Times 2020" webinar series for ECUs that has just been completed and which was sponsored by AATM, ADE, ACHE, ASTA and AzTEA. See https://sites.google.com/view/stem-collab-webinars-2020/home.

The AzTEA Fall Conference is scheduled for October 31st and will be virtual. See https://drive.google.com/drive/folders/1tRwrD8d-gldxseial7d9oSqj1F9UTAp2?usp=sharing.

The STEM AZ Education Collaborative 10th Anniversary - Unconference will be held on January 30th, 2021 and will be virtual. No collateral or links are available yet.

3.3.2. Labster Virtual Laboratory Simulations Consortium

Steve stated the AZBSN task force met with Labster in June. The AZBSN Task Force report is recommending that a virtual laboratories consortium for the state be explored, but not necessarily be limited to Labster technology.

3.3.3. GAZEL Innovative Learning Collaborative Initiatives for 2020

No report.

3.4. Arizona State Library (Holly Henley, Mala Muralidharan)

Mala reported that the Schools, Health & Libraries Broadband Coalition (SHLB) and the State E-rate Coordinator's Alliance (SECA) requested that the FCC consider an increase in funding of about \$70 - \$104 million to expand bandwidth capacity for existing E-rate school networks allowing them to meet greater online learning needs during the COVID-19 crisis.

Mala also reported that there are requests to extend the gift rule waiver beyond December 2020 to the end of the fiscal year and to include network security as an eligible E-rate expenditure.

Nicole Umayam reported on the success of the Connect Arizona Wi-Fi map with about 83,000 views to date. The Connect Arizona site is being widely promoted by ADE, School Connect, Common Sense Media, and others. The Connect Arizona site also offers tech support, a listing of service provider discounted broadband services for low income households and will offer services in Spanish.

Holly Henley reported that the Arizona State Library awarded all the CARES Act funding provided by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). The \$173,000 in grants awarded in the third CARES Supplemental phase for more than 23 library projects supported virtual museum tours, Wi-Fi access expansion, online student tutoring, job search support, virtual meeting rooms for public uses, digital preservation and documenting the COVID-19 crisis through photography. Holly also noted that the IMLS posted a grant spotlight featuring Arizona's use of the CARES Act funding.

Arizona State Library's Report for the September 9th ATIC Meeting

E-rate: Mala Muralidharan

- 1. E-rate and RHC augmented on-campus funding (filing): E-rate participants to expand their broadband capacity immediately State E-rate Coordinators Alliance (SECA) took the lead to put this request together for the FCC.
 - Found about 10-15 percent of public school districts (in states that responded to the survey) have intention or desire to increase bandwidth by double.
 - Based on this result the USAC E-rate data was mined and came up with an estimate of \$69 million to \$104 million. This is a conservative range.
 - It is requested retroactively, so that any school or library that has signed a contract and already incurred unexpected costs due to pandemic can be reimbursed. FCC wanted to understand in detail why there's a need for additional on-campus connectivity. WCB interested in discussing implementation.

The same limitations existed for the Rural Health Care program and they are also working on some numbers for submission including the challenges of getting patients connectivity at home.

Digital Inclusion: Nicole Umayam

Connect Arizona link is https://www.connect-arizona.com/

The free public wifi hotspots map on Connect Arizona has been viewed over 83,000 times and currently features 847 locations. The AZ LibTAP team is currently in their 8th week of offering free tech support and digital navigation services and has supported 130 calls so far. We plan to begin offering services in Spanish on October 1. Topics for the calls vary widely, but some examples include: what internet plans are available for households, how to learn basic computer skills online, how to use Google forms to make a survey and resource page for the library, how to access digital resources (such as ebooks) from the library, slow internet connections, safe Internet browser options for students, and Zoom troubleshooting.

Arizona State Library's CARES ACT funding: Holly Henley

The Arizona State Library awarded \$173,000 in grants throughout the state for more than 23 library projects. The grant money was made possible with federal CARES Act funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. Libraries around Arizona are using the funds to respond to the coronavirus and to expand digital access for their communities. Priority in this phase of CARES Act funding was given to projects that focused on library partnerships with museums and workforce development organizations. Some of the activities supported by the grant program include virtual museum tours, Wi-Fi access expansion, online student tutoring, job search support, virtual meeting rooms for public use, digital preservation, and documenting the COVID-19 crisis through photography. 3.6. Government Affairs (Bob Jacobson, Mark Goldstein)

Mark reported that the meeting with Ben Blink, the Governor's Policy Advisor for Transportation & Technology Innovation, was highly productive. Most of the time was devoted to broadband issues and the remainder, roughly a third of the session, dealt with Arizona Technology Council (AZTC) issues.

Mark is in the final stages of completing his broadband sections contribution to the AZTC 2021 Public Policy Guide. Since CompTIA has withdrawn their participation in contributing to the relevant federal broadband policies, Mark has asked Bob Jacobson to look at this for AZTC. Mark suggested including recommendations from the Western Governors Association Broadband Connectivity Policy Resolution and the possibility of addressing net neutrality. Bob said this might be an opportune time since Senator Kyrsten Sinema is a player in the net neutrality discussions.

Mark observed that other relevant topics for government affairs might include the notion of legislation for a State Broadband Development Authority as well as multistate licensure activity for nursing as a part of telehealth.

Ron Schott noted that the AZTC Public Policy Guide is in its final edit and Mark added that he will still be submitting an expanded section on federal broadband policy.

4.1. ATIC Website & Teleconferencing (All)

Mark and Steve observed that the ATIC website is aging a bit. For example, the resources page is out of date. They would like to leverage the website to publicize the recommendations report as well as using it for communications and public engagement, such as newsletters.

- (2) providing a regular newsletter about all that's going on in the broadband world.
