1.4. Treasurer's Report

Ron Schott, Treasurer, circulated via email the Desert Financial Credit Union statement with account and transaction details for Board reference, which are included at the back of these Minutes. Ron reported that he transferred \$500 from the Savings to the Checking Account. Current funds on hand total \$10,284.25.

Mark noted that the GAZEL account from which Steve Peters' \$2500 monthly payment comes is down to around \$7500 - \$8000. Steve has launched a sponsorship drive to raise further funding (https://www.arizonatele.org/funding-request-2020.html) and needs to become more active in securing some sponsorship renewals and new sponsorships by the end of the year.

Mark noted that ATIC needs to pursue its own funding, which would include sponsorships. ATIC needs to initiate a financial campaign for sponsors and other sources of funding to support and undertake new projects. Mark noted that in the past ATIC has been paid to host rural broadband workshops, and has pursued various projects when it had more funds.

1.5. ATIC Board Membership Considerations

Mark again noted that we have an ongoing interest in acquiring more representation from rural communities and tribal organizations.

Mark added that ATIC needs to get more engagement and possible sponsorships from some of the larger providers, such as Lumen, AT&T and Cox.

Mark sent a request for more contacts to Mala, Jeff Sobotka and Sandeep Bhowmick, and copied Steve. Steve has also offered to try to get help from some AZBSN connections. This closes the associated Action Item.

Mark spoke with Lanita Collette, the Deputy CIO and CISO at the University of Arizona, and she expressed some interest in becoming a board member. He also had a positive conversation with Germaine Pesquiera of Alluvion Communications, a subsidiary of Gila River Telecommunications, Inc.,

ACTION ITEM – Mark also took an Action Item to contact Robert Gallegos, the IT/Security Director for the Northern Arizona Council of Governments (NACOG) and Joy Whiting, Apache County Schools Superintendent who participates in the AZBSN task force to sound them out about joining the board.

MOTION: To nominate Erin Carr-Jordan to become a Member of the ATIC Board.

MOVE: Kirk Busch SECOND: Mark Goldstein Passed Unanimously

This gives us 26 Board Members. Oris will ask Erin to submit a photo and brief bio for the ATIC web site.

1.5.1. ATIC Broadband Providers Working Group Meeting and Next Steps

As reported previously, an outcome of the January ATIC Board meeting was to create an ATIC broadband service provider working group whose function would be similar to a trade association since there is no telecom service provider trade association in Arizona. The goal of this working group is to focus on addressing common issues and opportunities for the broadband service providers in Arizona. So far, broadband providers have expressed interest in exchange of information and possible formation of partnerships. The group was launched on April 6 with a hybrid gathering hosted at Big Data Southwest's DataCenter & SmartCity IoT Infrastructure Summit.

The participants advocated for a semi-private forum to exchange information and expressed a preference for asynchronous communication. Slack was suggested as a possible communication medium for this.

Mark has started a Slack channel, and he has invited a half-dozen people to join. He has developed a list of about 160 provider representatives from his spreadsheet. Kirk will assist in seeding the Slack channel. Mark raised the

possibility of meeting on November 9, preceding or following the ATIC board meeting, which may be in-person or hybrid.

Holly explained the potential venue at the Capitol should we decide to use it. It would require badged entry. Kirk said he could donate rental cost if we choose to use SkySong as our meeting venue. Kirk, Holly and Mark will discuss possibilities. So we may have a meeting of the Broadband Provider Working Group next month.

PJ Way mentioned that he would like to be included as a participant in that working group as a Coconino County representative. This led Mark to introduce a memo he had received from Janet Major. Specifically, she said: Why not have ATIC convene meetings to host county groups - quarterly reports, etc. It seems to me that a great solution would be to invite PJ [Way] to participate in ATIC as a board member to work on this project - with ATIC as the facilitator. Much like our program has done for telehealth thru our NATA/SATA/AZ Telehealth Alliance. We have also been hosting the TBAT/AZ Broadband Action team that has facilitated some of the great work happening in places like Colorado City - by hosting networking specifically for solving challenges with broadband for telemedicine. ATIC is the first thing that came to mind for me regarding this."

The led to a lengthy discussion about possible actions that ATIC could pursue. Mark thought maybe it could go beyond just the counties and include other economic development groups. PJ Way commented that from a Coconino County perspective, the educational and learning requirements aspect is what creates the current digital divide. The economic development groups would be eager to join such a venture. Mark asked if PJ would take a leadership role if we move in that direction. He said he would welcome that. Kirk applauded this line of thinking.

Erin Carr-Jordan noted that the Digital Equity group is meeting throughout the state to gather input. The IIJA provides insufficient funding, so the state needs sustainable solutions. We need to help the state meet its goals. This requires all of the counties to be engaged.

Jim Dilettoso talked about technology in agriculture. The missing link is the knowledge of the farmer. Can the tractor be self-driving, for example? They need education on technology. Corey suggested working with the local library to get the word out to farmers.

This led to the following decision: Mark said we should create parallel slack channels: one to discuss these topics on economic development and one on the Providers. Mark plans to ask PJ to join the board.

3.1.1. Rural Community Outreach & Projects

3.1.2. ACA Broadband Strategy & ATIC Role/Support

Jeff Sobotka has resigned as State Broadband Director at the Arizona Commerce Authority (ACA). Laura Etter said there are numerous rumors about who might succeed him, but for now Brian Sherman, Chief Innovation Officer at Arizona Commerce Authority is informally carrying the load.

She said the Sun Corridor Network continues to work with ASU and the Digital Equity Institute to implement the \$35 million county broadband grant.

In the interest of time, Mark suggested that we jump over some of the agenda topics we usually cover and go to Nan's report on AzTEA.

3.3. Greater Arizona Educational Leadership (Steve Peters, Nan Williams)

3.3.1. Arizona Technology in Education Association (AzTEA)

Nan Williams serves as Executive Director of AzTEA (https://aztea.org/) and sits on the EDTech Committee for the Arizona Department of Education (ADE) which is rewriting the Educational Technology standards this year. She is also participating in the ADE Technology Task Force on the Digital Learning Subcommittee and she is part of the ISTE policy group on digital equity access. She has also been working with the Arizona Rural Schools Association and their Final Mile Project (https://www.finalmileproject.com/).

Nan reported that all energies are focused on the AzTEA Fall Conference on October 29. Registration: https://conta.cc/3QrCeKZ. There will be prizes for costumes, and it is being held at the Chandler Innovation Center.

3.3.2. GAZEL Innovative Learning Collaborative Initiatives

The GAZEL Board hasn't met since late last year and needs reactivation and refreshing to further operationalize GAZEL. The Board still needs to acquire D&O insurance for good governance and proper protections.

Work to produce a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between GAZEL and ATIC on the AZBSN has been on hold and a determination should be made about whether this is still necessary and if so, how to accomplish.

3.4. Arizona State Library (Holly Henley, Mala Muralidharan)

Mala Muralidharan, E-rate Administrator for Public Libraries at the Arizona State Library, usually reports on E-rate and Arizona State Library activities.

Holly Henley said that Mala was at the SHLB conference in Virginia. Holly covered a few highlights of Mala's written report that Holly will submit later.

Regarding E-rate, in 2022 Arizona schools and libraries applied for \$120 million in reimbursements. To date \$63.4 million has been approved. The FCC has said they were recommending that no changes be made to the E-rate eligible services list, in spite of the request by the American Library Association and SHLB that cyber safety management be added to the list. The Affordable Connectivity Program has signed up more than 314,000 Arizona households. Arizona is ranked number 12 nationally in sign-up numbers.

Holly then reported on the telehealth event at Arivaca, which was exciting. They called it the Arivaca Community Health day, and the participants performed a number of health screenings with equipment provided by the state library grant funds. The screening included demos with a live connection to a doctor in Maine. Eye screenings for thirty people were performed by the Lions Club,

thanks to Ron Schott's involvement, using a high-tech camera. Throughout the day they conducted a total of 425 transactions at all the tables.

Ken Zambos, Program Manager for Workforce and Economic Development at Pima County Public Library, said he learned a lot from this pilot activity. Ken is also working with Corey Christians to explore the possibility of setting up a telehealth pilot in the village of Oak Creek near Sedona.

ATIC Oct 12, 2022 Mala's report

1. E-RATE

- For 2022 -AZ Schools and Libraries applied for S120 M and so far in the first 25 waves about 63.4
 - Million has been committed
- The window to file FCC form 470 or the RFPs are open and will stay open till approximately March 2023.
- State Master Contracts for E-rate end June 30th 2023. They are considering extensions for a year as they are not sure if the new contracts will be in place before the next application deadline in March 2023
- **Cyber attacks** Still a problem in several school districts all over the country including tribal areas.
- FY2023 Draft Eligible Services List Released -DA 22-878 PUBLIC NOTICE
 On August 22, 2022, the Federal Communications Commission issued a Public Notice seeking comment on its proposed Eligible Services List (ESL) for Funding Year 2023. The draft FY2023 ESL proposes no changes to product or service eligibility from the FY2022 ESL, with the Commission noting that "the Administrator and the Bureau are not recommending any specific changes to the proposed FY 2023 eligible services list."

 Comments to the proposed ESL were due on September 21, 2022, with reply comments due October 6, 2022. SEC, SHLB ALA have all filed requesting cyber safety management becomes e-rate eligible.
- Navajo Nation Fiber nothing special to report.
- 2. Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) is an FCC benefit program that provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month discount for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price. ACP is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household. Eligible households must both apply for the program and contact a participating provider to select a service plan.

 314,154 households signed up as of Oct 10th This is huge. We are 12th in the USA.

3. ECF 7.1 Billion Which is oversubscribed



4. Telehealth: The inauguration of the Pilot Telehealth Project was held on Oct 1st from 9am-12 pm at the Arivaca School House. There was a demonstration of the Telehealth service that will be available at the Ajo and Arivaca Libraries. Health screenings were done with a "live" doctor in Maine. Eye screening were done for over 30 community members. 33 vaccine were given. There were over 425 transactions at the various desks. ACP- low cost internet was promoted so too was the State Libraries 'Talking Book Library' serving those that have low or no vision, veteran's who can't hold a book and children with learning difficulties.



Arizona State Libraries Ramp Up as Telehealth Partners

According to the American Library Association, people turn to and depend on libraries and librarians for help in times of economic hardship. Libraries are now safe havens for people in need, including the homeless, mentally ill, immigrants, abuse victims and the impoverished. Many libraries have services for these visitors such as congregation areas for programs and resources, but now for the first time in history, some libraries also offer healthcare services.

- 1. Libraries are trusted places
- 2. Have highly qualified staff
- 3. Have the technology needed
- 4. Have broadband connectivity
- Libraries always involved in narrowing the digital divide





- Pilot healthcare at the library with an RN and student nurses – creating sustainability.
- Provide Libraries with Health Kits Digital scale; blood pressure cuff; no touch thermometer); EKO stethoscope 2 types EKO Software and license; Glucometer; Laptops.
- For those with small spaces in the library a privacy tent to be put up in the parking lot with Wi-Fi availability.
- Where possible, Mobile Vans equipped with Wi-Fi Antennae to go out into the community with the Health kits and Nurses and provide the telehealth service.
- Libraries have connectivity through E-rate funding and Navigators funded through an LSTA-IMLS project that have been assisting patrons for the past year.
- The State Library is partnering with SWTRC and U of A Telehealth team and with County Health Dept. and NAU Nursing consultants to pilot a program in Pima County (Arivaca and Ajo libraries) that can be replicated throughout Arizona





3.6 Government Affairs (Mike Keeling, Mark Goldstein)

Mark mentioned that the Arizona Technology Council (AZTC) 2023 Public Policy Guide of state and federal policy recommendations and prognostications is close to being released. 4. Information and Action Plans

4.1. ATIC Website & Teleconferencing (All)

As noted previously by Mark and Steve, the ATIC website is aging a bit. For example, the resources page is out of date. The website needs to be leveraged to publicize the COVID-19 Digital Access Task Force Report recommendations as well as using it for communications and public engagement, such as newsletters.

4.1.1. AZBSN Communications & Newsletter

Mark at a previous meeting suggested that we should think about how to leverage some of the information sessions from the Monday morning AZBSN-COVID Digital Access Task Force meetings.

There remains a continuing need for volunteers to work

- (1) on regular maintenance of the Weebly ATIC website and
- (2) on providing a regular newsletter about all that's going on in the broadband world.

4.2. ATIC Mailing List & CRM (All)

Steve is discussing with Mark and Kirk Busch subscribing to a CRM/E-mail management service to meet the needs of the AZBSN Task Force.

4.3. New Business and Motion Considerations (All)

ATIC vs. AZBSN Roles and AZBSN Governance.

At a previous meeting Mark reminded everyone of the issue raised by Janet recently concerning AZBSN governance and oversight. Since Janet is not present today this will be moved to the October meeting agenda. Henry mentioned that Janet was concerned about the definition of roles for ATIC as opposed to AZBSN. For ease of reference, below is a copy (in blue text) of Janet's concerns as documented at the June meeting:

Janet would like to discuss the future role of ATIC. Janet feels AZBSN is subordinate to ATIC but that ATIC "has been 'lost' in the shuffle – and that all expertise is not 'owned' by AZBSN. Does ATIC still want to be an authority and resource for the general public? Does AZBSN want to be an affiliate of ATIC? Or continue the outreach work of ATIC as telecom experts under the name of AZBSN?" Cybersecurity is one of the five pillars of digital equity on which AZBSN is focusing. Should ATIC also deal with cybersecurity? Kirk suggested that maybe we need to define the roles more specifically but it is important to build on the established AZBSN brand to avoid confusion. Mark agreed with Janet and Kirk that we should consider better defining the ATIC roles, and ATIC is creating a new broadband provider working group. Mark noted that AZBSN is a partnership of ATIC and GAZEL, but GAZEL no longer has an active Board. Steve noted that digital equity, including cybersecurity, will be a key mission for AZBSN. Mark commented that ATIC may partner with ACA on rural outreach and with the Arizona Telemedicine Program on telehealth events in the future.

Also at a previous meeting Mark added that we did start to develop a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in 2020 and the Executive Committee held several meetings on this topic. One of the decisions that was made was to let the finances of AZBSN operate under the management of GAZEL. However, the GAZEL Board has not met for some time and is not effectively acting in an operational capacity. Kirk Busch asked about the state of the draft MOU and Mark said he would send him a copy.


