Okay, so moving on that I'm gonna just jump into our presentation today. Uhhuh.

I wanna welcome Katie Mcgowan who's the senior manager of economic development with local first Arizona and you many of you may recall she's been attended.

Our meetings in the past, and shared information about local first, but I did want to invite her today to give us another update about what the economic recovery center is what the services they provide, because it's particularly important.

And I've said this before is that as we move ahead with doing our digital inclusion, planning that many organizations that were interested in getting funding are gonna have to put together a plan, they're gonna need to define who their target audience, is what areas are focusing on what kinds of services they

wanna provide how much money are they gonna need? And so forth.

And so the economic recovery center has resources to help with that planning.

So with that, Katie, I'm gonna stop. Do you need to share?

I do, if you don't mind.

So I will stop sharing.

And Steve, while Katie is sharing. I went ahead and put the public notice.

Okay. Thank you.

Oh, right, let's see. Can you all see the presentation?

[Steve Peters] 15:11:34

Yup!

Okay, perfect. Well, first of all, thank you, Steve, for that introduction, and thank you for inviting me back.

I am very excited to be back with you guys today and share with you a little bit more information about our program and what we've been up to, and and what we're doing moving forward so to start off.

I wanted to talk to you a little bit about why the center became what it is and the purpose behind it.

So those of you on the call mate be familiar with local first Arizona.

[Katie McCown] 15:12:12

That is the organization that I work for, and the department that I am in charge of is called the Economic Recovery Center.

[Katie McCown] 15:12:19

And while local first has been around for 20 years, the recovery center is just finishing up our second year in operation, and I tell you all of this to share with you a little bit of information about why we are doing what it is that we're doing so back in May of 2,021 when we

were all still in the height of Covid, and everything was coming down the pike in terms of Ppp loans, and idle loans, and all of those types of things for for profit businesses.

We weren't seeing a lot of additional assistance with Grants.

[Katie McCown] 15:12:58

And so our wonderful leader Kimberl Laning, went out and pitched the idea for the recovery Center to several statewide organizations to get their buy-in and get some funding to run the center and what we did in the very beginning was we went out and talked to people all over

the state, and just ask them, you know what are your challenges?

What is it that is preventing you from getting access to the grant funding that you would like to get?

And these were the top 3 things that came back. People were overextended, which I'm sure comes as no surprise to all of you.

A lot of times with very small nonprofits.

[Katie McCown] 15:13:36

People are being asked to do more and more, and wear more and more hats with fewer and fewer staff, going right along with that or budget constraints every year.

We're being asked to do more and more, with less and less money.

[Katie McCown] 15:13:48

And then while it's been so wonderful that a lot of grand uities have come down from the Federal Government with more grant opportunities, comes more competition.

And so organizations we're finding it very difficult to figure out where they fit in with all of those funding opportunities.

And what was best for them. So, after going out and having these conversations, we took that information back and tried to figure out, Okay, what can we do?

How can we best fill these gaps and provide our organizations?

[Katie McCown] 15:14:23

And Arizona with a leg up. On all of this grant, funding.

[Katie McCown] 15:14:27

So the first thing that we did was we set up our website, which is right here in the light blue.

It's economic recovery, az calm. And we started out with a new flash.

[Katie McCown] 15:14:38

We still do this Newsletter, in addition to all of our other services.

[Katie McCown] 15:14:42

But what we did was we started on a weekly basis, going in and seeing what all of the new Grant funding opportunities are that would apply to our organizations in Arizona.

We take all of those opportunities on a federal state, local and foundation level, and we pile them into a newsletter, and we send that out every month.

We also have all of those listed on our website as well.

[Katie McCown] 15:15:09

So the first way that you can get access to our services would be to sign up for this newsletter.

[Katie McCown] 15:15:16

So that you can see all of the funding that you are interested in.

[Katie McCown] 15:15:20

Organized by category specifically for you. And then after that, we developed some additional services that I will go through in the next few slides.

[Katie McCown] 15:15:31

But the most important thing I want to mention first is that all of these services are provided at no charge. So nothing that we're going to talk or everything that we're going to talk about today will not cost an organization anything.

So what does that look like? So we have our support areas, as we call them, organiz into pre and post grant application.

[Katie McCown] 15:15:57

So the first way that we can help is by making sure that an organization is grant-ready.

[Katie McCown] 15:16:04

Sometimes we have people come to us who know that they need funding but they aren't sure exactly how to go about it.

[Katie McCown] 15:16:09

If that is the case, we can help make sure that people are signed up on Sam.

[Katie McCown] 15:16:14

Have dones, numbers all of those things that they might need to have in place before they are able to submit a grant application.

[Katie McCown] 15:16:22

The second way that we can jump in and help is with Grant research.

[Katie McCown] 15:16:27

And this is what we spend a lot of our time doing when an organization comes to us with a need, we talk through their history with Grant, funding.

Have they ever applied for anything before? Have they won anything in the past?

[Katie McCown] 15:16:39

And what is it that they need that funding for specifically?

[Katie McCown] 15:16:42

Once we do that my team and I will take that information back.

[Katie McCown] 15:16:47

And we conduct research. We look at federal, State, local and foundation grant opportunities, and we pull together a curated list of everything that that organization would qualify for, whether or not it's even open at this time we have a master list that we've created of all of the grants that we typically see which most as you

probably know, are on an annual cycle. So even if you come to us in March, and the perfect grant for you doesn't open until July will still send that over to you, so that you have a full picture of everything that you qualify for after that, we can bring in a grant writer to assist you

with the Grant application. We have 30 different Grant writers on our roster.

[Katie McCown] 15:17:30

They all have different areas of expertise when it comes to the types of grants they like to write, and the types of content that they like to write about.

[Katie McCown] 15:17:37

So depending on whatever the opportunity is, we will pick the person who has the most appropriate experience make that introduction, and then they help you and hold your hand through the whole process of getting everything written and submitted.

After the grant application has been submitted, and a decision has come down which hopefully is a winning decision.

[Katie McCown] 15:18:01

But even if it isn't, we can still provide some additional services as well.

[Katie McCown] 15:18:06

So, for example, a lot of times we will help maybe a very small nonprofit when their first Federal grant and they're so excited.

[Katie McCown] 15:18:16

But then a month in they call me, and they're like Katie.

[Katie McCown] 15:18:18

We't know what we're doing. We don't know how to execute on this.

[Katie McCown] 15:18:21

And so in cases like that, we have another list of contractors that we can deploy to assist with all the kind of ancillary things that an organization from grant management to grant reporting specifically the financial reporting because that tends to be the most complicated, stressful part we also have

facilitators who can help convene a group together.

[Katie McCown] 15:18:47

If, for example, a group of nonprofits has come together to apply for a grant, they've won it.

[Katie McCown] 15:18:53

But now they need a little bit help getting organized and figuring out who's gonna do what and how they're gonna execute on everything we have people who can assist with that like I said facilitators strategic planners, project managers all of the above we are here really to

assist an organization from the very beginning to the very end of not only the grant application process, but executing on all of the deliverables, that they might need to do the reason.

Behind. This is we really, from the very beginning of the recovery center, are working to work ourselves out of a job. We're working to build the capacity of these organizations so that they can continue to apply for larger grants and execute on larger grants and they no longer need our help anymore.

So these are the people who qualify for our services. These are the types of organizations that we work with.

[Katie McCown] 15:19:49

We work with nonprofits, municipalities, or county governments, and tribal organizations.

[Katie McCown] 15:19:56

They have to be located either in rural Arizona or in an underserved part of a more metropolitan city, like Phoenix or Tucson.

[Katie McCown] 15:20:07

For example, if an organization falls into one of those buckets and they do not have a Grant writer on staff, they do not have a development team on staff, then they qualify to work with us and everything that we provide is at no cost.

[Katie McCown] 15:20:22

If an organization is unsure, whether or not they qualify, we still say, come to us, we'll figure it out, and we will help you as much as we can.

[Katie McCown] 15:20:30

If an organization ends up having a Grant writer, and we can't provide all of our support, we can still help them find the the right grants that would fit their organizations, or, if you know, they're located in Phoenix or something like that, for example, we can still

connect them with a Grant writer. They would just have to pay for those services out of their budget.

[Katie McCown] 15:20:52

So, no matter what is going on, we tell people come to us, and we'll figure out how we can help.

[Katie McCown] 15:21:00

I kind of went through all of these things already, but as I mentioned, you qualified, you don't have a Grant writer on staff, and you are in rural or an underserved part of the State.

[Katie McCown] 15:21:13

This is a sheet that has a lot of information on it.

[Katie McCown] 15:21:17

But basically breaks down everything we've put to accomplish so far.

[Katie McCown] 15:21:21

So since May of 2021, we have worked with just under 600 organizations.

[Katie McCown] 15:21:27

We have 114 grants, which totals just over 31 million dollars.

[Katie McCown] 15:21:33

One of our major goals for 2022 was to make sure that we helped win at least one grant in every county, and we were able to do that, and we will continue to focus on that moving into 2023 or the rest of 2,023.

I should say, as well, and so it gives you a little bit more of a breakdown by county in terms of the number of organizations we've assisted, and grants that have been won.

In addition to the total dollar amount that we've been able to secure for organizations in those counties, and one thing I want to make sure, that I mentioned because this question comes up a lot is that all of the funding goes directly to the organization.

We do not take any cut of it whatsoever. We exist to help organizations further, what it is that they are already doing.

[Katie McCown] 15:22:24

These are the sponsors that I mentioned at the very beginning of the presentation.

[Katie McCown] 15:22:30

These are the groups that provide the funding to the requirement center, so that we are able to operate the way that we do and provide our services at no cost.

So we want to make sure that we acknowledge them here and say thank you to them for all of their wonderful support.

[Katie McCown] 15:22:50

Here again is the link to our website. And out on this website you can find a place where you can register for the newsletter.

You can find a place where you can set up an appointment to meet with myself and my team, to discuss your organization's specific grant funding needs.

And then we also have all of our grants that we have compiled onto the website organized by category organized by type.

So you're able to go in and see a bunch of Grant information.

There, as well.

And then here is my contact information, and I can pop it into the chat as well.

And I can also send Steve this presentation to share out.

But you've got my email there and my phone number.

And I know that was a lot of information to kind of throw at everybody. So I can go ahead and stop sharing and answer any questions that anyone might have.

And that brings up something else that I should mention that the way that our budget is for 2023 is that we are able to support up to 4 applications per organization.

This calendar year. So our services are not one and done, but they are also not unlimited either.

And so we just want to make sure that we mentioned that.

So that people keep that in mind, and yes, I will post my information here very quickly.

Okay. Other questions or comments for Katie.

So couple of quick things. Last week I talked to Nicole, and I have not been able to reach Sandip yet, but we discussed being able to do perhaps some workshops, webinars, or something, with Katie and with others to pick up with more detail about what this digital inclusion

planning look like for an organization? How would they go about it?

[Steve Peters] 15:25:41

What kinds of support is available, such as the resources that that Katie discussed.

So we'll be looking further into that opportunity and see what.

But that's why I invited Katie today.

[Steve Peters] 15:25:56

Because we are going to be rapidly moving towards, hopefully, rapidly moving towards our digital inclusion planning. And our organizations really need to be prepared to submit their request.

our staff member, who is in charge of that, and I can put her information here in the chat as well.
