Well, I, as we started looking at this, that it became clear that a lot of the same information that people are gonna need to provide, it's for to sign up for access.

Excuse me, are going to also have to it's the same kind of information that people would need to provide to sign up for a Cp. Or the Arizona.

Are the affordable connectivity program. And so we started looking at, how can we collaborate with them in this effort?

So Mauricio Orozco who's manager community engagement with Care First health plan, and Erin Laurindo, who's the Digital Inclusion Library consultant with the State Library, will lead our task, force our will lead the task force collaboration with Marcus and Lyle Ishida. Lyle is with the Federal Communications Commission, and he participate in our first meeting. As we had discussion about this, and so those 2 have stepped up.

No relation. Dawn Jones, with the division of benefits and medical eligibility, who has all that great information on our partnership with the ACP.

So hopefully her slides will be approved and ready by next Monday.

And looking forward to sharing that information with you.

So. Thank you, Steve.

Right? Yeah, thanks. April. So April has been a regular attendee in our meetings and just realized that catch we never heard from her, and it made sense as we move, to have with ACP. So April, looking forward to the information from you and Don.

But I really wanna jump into our resource highlight today and introduce Dr. Brian Carter, who is the principal investigator and director for the project the 3 million dollar grant that the University of Arizona has received to expand Internet and digital inclusion in southern Arizona and so I'm gonna just introduce Brian.

I'm gonna turn it over to you, Brian.

[Steve Peters] 15:11:23

And I'm gonna to stop sharing. Do you need to share anything?

[Bryan Carter] 15:11:28

No, not at the moment unless unless someone wants to see a bit more information about the center which I can definitely share as as needed.

[Bryan Carter] 15:11:38

So first of all, everyone. Thank you so much. For allowing me to speak to the group.

[Bryan Carter] 15:11:41

I hope to become maybe a working member of the group.

[Bryan Carter] 15:11:43

In some way, because the center for digital humanities has a lot to offer.

[Bryan Carter] 15:11:49

I think, to something like this. Let me give you a bit of background.

[Steve Peters] 15:11:51

Brian, if I can interrupt. So I mentioned earlier for those of you who are on a little earlier that although he didn't remember me, but I remember him from about 1510, 15 years ago, and the reason I remember him is that he was a but he was way ahead of everybody and looking at how you

provide online learning and doing really innovative and creative kinds of things.

[Bryan Carter] 15:12:12

Well, thank you so much. Yeah, well, thank you.

[Steve Peters] 15:12:16

So I remember you, Brian, because of that.

[Bryan Carter] 15:12:27

Actually, it's that's a very good segue, because I hadn't planned on going that far back.

[Bryan Carter] 15:12:32

But my experience with these kinds of digital technologies has really led me to the University of Arizona, and ultimately becoming the director of the Center for digital Humanities.

[Bryan Carter] 15:12:44

And and basically what the center is is we are a research incubator.

[Bryan Carter] 15:12:48

I currently employ approximately 31, 32 students, mostly undergrad students with a range of majors from computer science to film television and media graphic arts, etc.

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:01

And they work on real-world projects to, to, to include advanced websites, digital scanning.

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:08

We do 3, 60 videography and digital storytelling.

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:12

And I believe we have one of the few, if not the only, volumetric capture.

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:16

Stages on a college campus, and in the desert southwest at least, we're doing some really interesting things, Steve.

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:23

You mentioned that we were doing some things cool with with, with online technologies.

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:28

Many years ago. Now we're actually performing a study that looks at the effective volumetric video, which is basically 3D video where you can scan a QR code with a mobile device and then see a person standing right in front of you that's being broadcasted from another location that

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:44

has a of all capstage, and you can then PIN that person to the ground and walk around them.

[Bryan Carter] 15:13:50

And we're actually able to incorporate, live two-way audio as a part of that communication and so we're doing the study this semester to look at how that affects teaching and learning.

[Bryan Carter] 15:14:00

That is a part of all the things that you're going to hear about regarding the Commerce Department in Tia Grant, which really has, you know, fed right into part of the mission of the center for digital humanities.

[Bryan Carter] 15:14:14

So our mission, it originally began to work with faculty in the College of Humanities to support their research, increasing various technologies into their research and teaching.

[Bryan Carter] 15:14:25

We've then expanded after a big grant from the from the Knight foundation we expanded to work with universities and colleges outside of I'm sorry colleges outside of the College of Humanities as well as university Units.

[Javier Baca] 15:14:38

Okay.

[Bryan Carter] 15:14:40

I like the museums and art galleries on campus, eventually moving off campus after receiving some other funding from the national endowment for the humanities, and eventually internationally, after receiving yet another grant from n all incorporating these various advanced technologies in teaching

and learning, or for digital storytelling that LED us to.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:04

Of course, I further supporting our mission, which is to I.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:07

Work with underserved communities around our campus. So we worked with Dunbar.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:13

We worked with, we've worked with a number of underserved areas around the campus on it, on a variety of projects to include a digital storytelling AR project, etc., etc.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:24

So when we heard about the Ntia Grant 2 years ago, we applied almost 2 years ago.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:31

We applied. And you know, I, Paul, I think you can probably attest to this.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:35

How long it took them to get back to us. Gosh!

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:36

I think we waited. It must have been 2 years almost and of course you know, a lot of things change.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:42

But we got the word gosh! It must have been back in January, that we were awarded, and that, of course, as you saw in email incorporates a three-pronged approach to to really tackling addressing broadband issues.

[Bryan Carter] 15:15:56

And access issues here in Southern Arizona.

[Bryan Carter] 15:16:00

The first was, of course, to expand the microcampus and digital classroom technologies at various locations.

[Bryan Carter] 15:16:08

Douglass, Yuma Pascal, Yaki, and Thatcher were universities of Arizona, has micro campus locations that was one of the requirements that the the sites had to be within a certain radius of a microcampus or a location related to

the university. We're also working with the Dunbar and the the Tucson Urban League.

[Bryan Carter] 15:16:31

Here in in Tucson. So we're expanding the broadband access to those locations.

[Bryan Carter] 15:16:35

We're also incorporating. I am further access to STEM related courses to these distant locations, and we're increasing the electronic or digital classrooms here so that the faculty members will be able to project their their classroom materials to these other locations part of

[Bryan Carter] 15:16:58

the ways that they're going to be doing that will incorporate some of the newer technologies that we've been researching at the center to include 3 60 videography so that people at remote locations can pop on a headset and they will feel as if they are in the classroom with everyone

else this can be done either asynchronously or synchronously. We're also going to be looking at incorporating volumetric and holographic video broadcasting because some people's learning styles are work a little bit differently when they have a person or at least

a rendition of a person standing right in front of them.

[Bryan Carter] 15:17:33

Not a not a avatar. That's a cartoony, you know, looking something that I mean a real person.

[Bryan Carter] 15:17:38

It really looks quite nice. The second prong is to increase physical Hardware act to students that fall within a certain income bracket.

[Bryan Carter] 15:17:50

And so we're working with our library to create these these technologies, packets.

[Bryan Carter] 15:17:58

I guess you could say our boxes that contain a laptop a webcam headets, a router as well as a Myf.

[Bryan Carter] 15:18:06

I unit so that they'll be able to get connected Internet wherever they happen to be.

[Bryan Carter] 15:18:13

As long as there's at least sell network. And then, lastly, we're gonna be working with the Dunbar and the Tucson Urban League to create workforce development, financial literacy and Creative and productivity development tools and a short courses so that people in those environments will be able

to access these short, not for credit or not accredited courses, but courses that will teach them how to do these basic sorts of tools that will teach them how to do these basic sorts of tools that will increase their literacy in these variety of areas we then hope to be able to share those

those creations with the other members of our network. So that's really the whole pronged approach. It's a 2 year, Grant, as you know, and we're really excited to to get working with not only our partners, but also with partner Cox in order to continue

to expand this, and then see where this goes with regards to the next step in increasing not only access, but also beginning to share resources between these communities.

Yes, though. Resources. Thank you, Amala. Those resources were Thatcher Douglas, Yuma!

And Dunbar, Tucson Urban League, or the Dunbar Springs Area.

Here in Tucson. I'm sorry about that.

[Bryan Carter] 15:19:32

So that's what we're doing. We're once again.

[Bryan Carter] 15:19:35

We're so excited we can't wait to get students involved in a lot of this research.

[Bryan Carter] 15:19:38

We're doing a lot of support with regards to hiring site managers and Project Coordinator as well as lab technicians that will support the other technologies that's going to be that are going to be installed at all of these sites because we didn't want to leave people

just with a bunch of technology and no one really to support it, or anything like that.

We didn't want to leave people, just, you know, with a bunch of technology, and no one really to support it, or anything like that.

And then, of course, we're funding the development of the various short courses that that will be created and then shared between.

So. Are there any questions about any of that that I've introduced to you?

That's awesome.

[Bryan Carter] 15:20:12

Thank you.

[Steve Peters] 15:20:15

Questions people have.

[Bryan Carter] 15:20:15

Questions.

[Steve Peters] 15:20:18

So, Philip, this should be right along with the office of digital teaching and learning, with the Department of Education.

[Phillip Seng] 15:20:28

Yeah, definitely, gonna have to reach out to Dr. Carter.

[Bryan Carter] 15:20:32

Can't wait to talk to you Philip. I really think that we've taken a a major move into volumeetric I and holographic broadcasting to be able to.

[Bryan Carter] 15:20:43

You know, project your presence to one-way audio to over 10,000 people, but to have 2 way audio communication with with a hologram is really quite an interesting feature, and we really, I really do believe that it affects learning a little bit differently when

[Bryan Carter] 15:20:59

you've got someone in front of you instead of in a, in a television screen or in a little window on it on a computer screen. It's a little bit different.

[Steve Peters] 15:21:07

So, Brian, the University, if I understand correctly, that's been expanding their innovative learning classrooms just associated with that at all.

[Bryan Carter] 15:21:16

Yes.

[Bryan Carter] 15:21:19

Yes and no. It's associated with it in a way, because the innovative learning classrooms is LED by a community learning group within the university, which is sort of spearheaded.

[Bryan Carter] 15:21:33

The various technologies that we wanted to see installed in some of those classrooms.

[Bryan Carter] 15:21:35

The STEM classrooms have not necessarily been wholly included in those, because those sometimes those classrooms are sometimes not centrally managed.

[Bryan Carter] 15:21:45

So the university digital classrooms are all centrally managed and anyone can reserve those for classes.

[Bryan Carter] 15:21:53

The still ones are just for those individuals, and those are the ones we're gonna be beefing up, particularly for this to incorporate some of those newer technologies, such as a high-resolution highframe rate, 360 k camera on the cinders and on the faculty

members, end, and then the appropriate headset on the receivers end so that they'll it'll feel as if you're really in the classroom.

[Bryan Carter] 15:22:14

It's really, quite, quite interesting.

[Steve Peters] 15:22:16

So Brian, one of the things that we have this task force has been not just us and it's a discussion throughout the country is digital navigators that it's great to give people technology.

[Steve Peters] 15:22:28

But if they can't use it, it's not very helpful, and so can you talk at all about with what you're trying to do here?

[Steve Peters] 15:22:35

It sounds very much that you're going to be doing some things.

[Steve Peters] 15:22:38

But digital navigators, and related to that is, how can we?

[Steve Peters] 15:22:42

Is there a way for us to tap into the students that you're going to be working with?

[Steve Peters] 15:22:47

That might be interested in helping to be a resource and helping people to adopt technology.

[Bryan Carter] 15:22:53

It's a brilliant idea. Yes, I think digital navigators are crucial with regards to onboarding people with these new

[Bryan Carter] 15:23:01

Even though it may seem natural. Once you start using, say, a headset, and oh, I feel like I'm in this classroom.

[Bryan Carter] 15:23:08

But getting to that point is where the digital navigators come into play.

[Bryan Carter] 15:23:13

So yes, we're definitely gonna be making use of those individuals as part of the lab manager's duties to assess people with some of that onboarding as well as the site managers, duties.

That would basically spearhead what the community needed from this sort of technology input and that's the same thing that was done at Duncan Bar, where you know, as a part of this whole grant process, we liaised with the community to find out if they needed or wanted health care workforce development financial literacy

or what you know within those areas they wanted most that we could roll into this grant that would then be most useful and most beneficial to those communities.

As Cindy mentioned in these small organizations in particular, who, at least in my opinion, if they expect to get funding through that process that they are going to have to come up with plans, they're gonna need to talk about who they serve what they wanna provide how much is it gonna cost what kind of staff

they need, and all of that that can get funneled into the plan.

And so I need to talk with Sandy about whether the people that he's hiring are going to include that as a part of their planning process, or if we need to convene one or more sessions, particularly with the economic recovery center who provides free technical support and training and

planning, for nonprofit organizations that can help these folks to get a jump on that process as we move along.

They said that they received hundreds of thousands of corrections for the map that youes for the map, and there working on it now, and the process is that they look at it first, and then they send it to the service providers to verify that the data the data in the sense of

they're looking at locations and the service providers will tell them what the speeds are that they can provide in those areas.

[Mala Muralidharan] 16:05:10

So they're working on that. And that's a whole like 4 to 6 months process.

So the next version version 2 of the map is gonna come out in this fall, and that's the version that's gonna be used by deed for by Ntia for the bead funding, so that's a very crucial one sadly all of the the challenges that

[Mala Muralidharan] 16:05:37

we can provide has already been, has already gone. We can't provide any more challenges, for that part of the process.

[Mala Muralidharan] 16:05:45

But yes!

Ntia had committed to a June thirtieth.

[Mark Goldstein] 16:05:51

Announcement of the bead allocations. Are you saying that's going to be now delayed?

[Mala Muralidharan] 16:05:59

They will announce it. The map itself may not be completely ready by then, but most of what they need to incorporate.

[Mala Muralidharan] 16:06:10

As I said, it would incorporate the locations, but it may not incorporate the speeds, because that's that's right, that's right.

[Mark Goldstein] 16:06:15

Well, it will be a work in the Progress for the next 10 years.

But okay, I thought I was hearing that they might slip the date.

The June, Thirtieth Allocation Committee. Okay.

So, but the version that we can use internally for distributing the funds within the State after we've received the allocation can will be the next version that's coming out in spring 2024.

And that will be the version that the States can use for redistribution of the money that they have received.

[Mala Muralidharan] 16:06:58

So the planning process is on now for the State, and as Steve mentioned, we each in our own little spaces, need to get our groups together to make sure that we have.

We are getting the needs of the grassroots level folks incorporated into the final plan.

The final plan, I think, has to go. They've given 230 days.

I'm not correct. I'm not sure that I'm correct about that.

But since the allocation of the funding, the planning, funding, so we received the planning funding, I think, somewhere around November.

So we have until September. If my calculations are right for us to get the planning done, or get the plan somewhat done, so that we we have, we know which direction we are going.

So we really, really need to work fast on this planning process.

So that we know where we are just how we are going to distribute the money, and that should be our focus for the next few months.
