#### The Digital Divide: A Call to Action from Arizona School Board Members

We are now nearly two weeks into school closures. The Digital Divide is front and center. The disparities are growing. The achievement gap is widening because our students in low-income communities across urban and rural Arizona have always had access to less opportunities. They rely heavily on our schools to provide that access. During the closures, too many of our students are being left behind – farther behind.

We. Governing Board members across Arizona, are not only signing on to the letter published by Superintendents last week, but we are turning up the volume on the megaphone. We need action: We need action now.

Youth across Arizona in low-income and rural communities are still without academic and social-emotional support. Educators across our state in suburban and middle-class neighborhoods are not only delivering lessons online, but they are also providing virtual counseling sessions and wellness checks. Youth without access to a device and/or the internet are not only missing out on learning, they are also becoming more and more isolated. Depression and anxiety were already at frighteningly high levels. This pandemic, and the seclusion it will cause, is reason for abundant concern from all Arizona residents.

Philanthropy is fundraising at record-high levels, but more needs to be done. Many technology and communications companies have stepped up, but they need to take bigger and bolder steps. Business and industry must contribute. And should lawmakers return in April, helping youth living in poverty and youth in rural communities get access to devices and/or internet must be a large part of any relief or stimulus package.

Simply put, technology in Arizona must be a right, not a privilege. Our schools cannot






# \$465,000 AUSF Dollars Unused during COVID-19

Request in April 2020: "Docket No. AU-00000A-20-0050 (Regarding COVID-19); Docket No. RT-00000H-97-0137 (Regarding Arizona Universal Service Fund); Commission discussion, consideration, and possible vote regarding the immediate, emergency disbursement of up to \$500,000 in unused Arizona Universal Service Fund dollars to the Arizona Department of Education to assist the Department in addressing the digital divide resulting from COVID-19 and help to ensure continued, universal, equal, and equitable access to broadband internet for Arizona students during state-wide school closures."



Established in 1989 through the Arizona Unity Agreement in response to competition in the telecom industry. (Decision No. 56639) (AT&T, US West, Contel of the West, Southwestern Telephone, Arizona Telephone, Valley Telephone, Citizens Utilities, etc.)

 Created to subsidize landline service providers whose costs would be increased due to competition and increased costs to consumers associated with serving rural areas in a competitive marketplace.

At creation, the telecom companies wanted applicants to file a rate case showing that rates would increase by more than \$4.00.

# Arizona USF High Cost Fund - Current Structure

- In 1989, the ACC denied the parties' request for a \$4.00 cap and adopted a five-factor test instead.
- Today, the AUSF is funded by 315 "Category One" & "Category Two" service providers.


#### Category One providers:

- \$0.016328 per access line
- \$0.163280 per interconnecting trunk line

### Category Two providers:

- 0.3418 percent of intrastate toll revenues
- The ACC has jurisdiction to increase or decrease the surcharge amounts each year.
- With the Category One & Two contributions, the AUSF collects approximately \$1.2 million each year.

### - Continuous, Automatic Subsidy

- No incentive or requirement to return to the Commission for a new rate case, once the subsidy has been granted.
- 1 recipient has received the same amount of funds for the last 30 years (October 10, 1989).
- The recipient has not filed an application for a rate case since 1989.
- A recurring, automatic subsidy may be contrary to the intent stated in the 1989 decision.

#### Rate Case Requirement

- 14 potential recipients in Arizona (Frontier, Navajo, Valley, Table Top, Copper Valley, etc.)
- But, only 1 potential recipient has applied for and received funds over the last 30 years.
- The rate case requirement may be serving as a deterrent for competitive companies.

#### Valid Intent, Obsolete Mechanism


- Commitment to "universal service" and providing the "broadest connectivity reasonably attainable"
- Even with the AUSF in place, rural landline service is diminishing
- Stagnant or negative customer growth
- 54 CC&N deletions since 1991; 34 have occured in the last 10 years.
- Large telecom companies now subsidize their landline services through other business revenues


## What other states have done:

Arkansas	Requires HCF to be used for broadband
California	Allows HCF to be used for broadband in rural areas
Colorado	Transitions HCF to broadband use over time
Maine	Allows flexibility to use funds for broadband
New Mexico	60% of USF must go toward broadband access
Oregon	\$5 Million a year of USF funds dedicated to broadband
Utah	Allows USF to be used for broadband
Vermont	Allows USF to be used for broadband
Wisconsin	Allows USF to be used for broadband




### **Possible Solutions**

- Continuous, Automatic Subsidy → One-Time Grant
  - Applicants/Recipients will continue to be Commission-jurisdictional public service corporations
  - Funds could be used to reduce the cost of construction for bona fide broadband projects
  - Funds would no longer be used to subsidize landline service or current / future broadband service
- Rate Case Requirement → Application Requirement
  - The ACC-jurisdictional PSC must currently provide or have bona fide plans to provide broadband service (such as by providing designs, drawings, contracts, subcontracts, and financing)
  - Technology agnostic (e.g., fiber, broadband over power, microwave tower, 5G, satellite, wireless, etc.)
- Valid Intent, Obsolete Mechanism → Transition the AUSF to Adapt to Modern 'Universal Service' Needs
  - Continued commitment to providing the "broadest connectivity reasonably attainable," including broadband
  - Transition period to phase-in the new process & provide sufficient notice
  - No change to the existing collection mechanism or amount.
  - The new process needs to be streamlined & reasonable in relation to the award amount.
  - Minimize the impact to existing AUSF recipients.
